ELECTION BULLETINS

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—At 9 o'clock tonight, Chairman Herbert Parsons, of the Republican county committee, said: "Mr. Hughes is unquestionably elected and will have a plurality of 40,000. As to the Congressmen I feel that Mr. Bennett, Mr. Olcott and myself are also elected, and I am informed that Mr. Wells has been elected in the Bronx."

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Sixteen hundred and thirty-two districts outside of New York City give Hughes 259,861, Hearst 198,827. The same districts in 1904 gave Higgins 293,049, Herick 213,496.

Four hundred and twenty election districts out of 507 in borough of Brooklyn give Hearst 87,209, Hughes 87,003.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Fifteen hundred and six districts outside of New York, one half the State outside of New York City, give Hughes 241,947, Hearst, 186,750.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—1,920 districts outside of New York, gave Hughes, 304,654; Hearst, 226,923.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—1210 districts in Greater New York give Hearst 267,583; Hughes, 203,355.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—1,140 election districts out of 1,487 in Greater New York gives Hearst 226,932; Hughes, 175,224.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—1,941 districts outside of New York City give Hughes 290,977; Hearst 217,497.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—2,719 districts, outside of New York City, give: Hughes, 338,466; Hearst, 248,445.

The same districts in 1904 gave Higgins 382,277; Herick, 271,312.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—At 11:45 p. m. the World says that Chamler, Democrat and Independence League, was elected Lieutenant Governor.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Twenty-five hundred and five districts, five-sixths of the districts outside New York City, give Hughes 387,034; Hearst 280,285. If this ratio is maintained Hughes will come to New York City with 126,000 majority.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Max Ihmsen, Mr. Hearst's campaign manager, said at 9:35 o'clock tonight that he believed that Mr. Hearst had a safe working majority despite claims to the contrary.

Lewis Stuyvesant Chamler, candidate for Lieutenant Governor on the Independence League and Democratic tickets, when told tonight of the report that he had been elected said: "I should be very sorry indeed to be elected if Mr. Hearst should be defeated."

MICHIGAN.

BAY CITY, Mich., Nov. 6.—For Congress, in the Michigan Tenth district, George A. Lord, Republican, is elected. He had no opposition.

For Congress in the Fifth Michigan district William Alden Smith, Republican, is elected. In the Second district, Charles E. Townsend, Republican, is elected. In the Eighth district, Joseph W. Fordney, Republican, is elected.

For Congress in the Fourth district, Edward L. Hamilton, Republican, is elected.

DETROIT, Mich., Nov. 6.—Governor Warner and the entire Republican ticket have been elected by sixty to one hundred thousand. The Republican Congressional candidates in each of the twelve Michigan districts have been elected and the Republicans will have a large majority in the State Legislature with a possibility of its entire membership.

FLORIDA.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Nov. 6.—All the Democratic candidates in Florida are elected. The Legislature is probably unanimously Democratic. The proposition advocated by Governor Broward to drain the Everglades seems to be defeated.

MINNESOTA.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Nov. 6.—For Congress: Third district, Charles R. Davis, Republican; Seventh district, Andrew J. Volsted, Republican; Eighth district, J. Adam Bede, Republican; Ninth district, Halver Steenerson, Republican, elected. First district, J. A. Tawney, Republican, is elected. All Democratic nominees for Congress are elected.

WINCONSIN.

MINWAUKEE, Nov. 6.—For Congress: First district—Henry A. Cooper, R. Sixth district—Charles H. Weisz, D. Seventh district—John J. Esch, Republican. Eighth district—James H. Davidson, Republican. Tenth district—Elmer A. Morse, Republican. Eleventh district—John J. Jenkins, Republican, elected.

NEW MEXICO.

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Nov. 6.—Partial returns from seven counties out of 25 in New Mexico give joint statehood a majority of 2,000. Reports so far received indicate that the territory will go for jointure by from 4,000 to 7,000. Early reports indicate the election of Andrews, Republican, delegate to Congress.

OHIO.

CINCINNATI, Ohio, Nov. 6.—Returns are coming in slowly. Returns received from ten precincts in Cincinnati indicate that the Democrats have carried the city.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Nov. 6.—24 precincts out of 264 in Cleveland, give Hoskins, Democrat, for Secretary of State, 5,521; Thompson, Republican, 2,560. Some precincts last year gave Herrick, Republican for Governor, 3,138; Patterson, Democrat, 3,531.

CINCINNATI, Nov. 6.—Sixty precincts outside of Cincinnati, Cleveland, Columbus and Toledo, give Thompson, Republican, for Secretary of State, 4,369; Hoskins, Democratic, 3,600.

The same precinct in 1905 gave Pattison, Democrat, 4,484 and Herrick, Republican, 4,300, a Republican gain of 87.

For Congress—in the Twenty-first district, Theodore E. Burton, Republican, is elected.

SPRINGFIELD, Ohio, Nov. 6.—26 precincts in Springfield and Clark county show the entire Republican ticket elected by pluralities of from 1,200 to 1,500.

PENNSYLVANIA.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 6.—The polls closed in this city at 7 o'clock tonight without any serious disorder. The unusually heavy vote polled today is taken as an indication that the local fusion ticket headed by D. Clarence Gibbonney for district attorney has polled a strenuous vote.

Edwin S. Stuart, Republican candidate for Governor, will probably run ahead of Samuel P. Rotan, Republican candidate for district attorney, in nearly all of the wards. Both the Republicans and fusionists claim victory in the city.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 6.—10:40 p. m.—Returns to this hour show consistent Republican gains throughout the State and indicate the election of Stuart, Republican, for Governor, by a large majority over Emery, Fusion. In Philadelphia Dotan, Republican, is elected District Attorney, defeating Gibbonney, Fusion.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Nov. 6.—Returns from 98 districts give Stuart 7,240; Emery 4,548. County Chairman, O'Neill of the Citizens party said that Dalzell's majority will be 8,000. Dalzell carried McKeesport, the home of Robert J. Black, his opponent, by 1,000.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Nov. 6.—The Inquirer claims Stuart has carried the city by sixty thousand plurality and Rotan by 50,000.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 6.—At 11 p. m. Chairman Black, of the Republican city committee, issued a statement claiming Stuart has carried the city by more than 50,000 and Rotan by not less than 45,000. Mr. Black said: "The result shows that the people of Philadelphia think for themselves."

PITTSBURG, Pa., Nov. 6.—United States Senator Penrose at 10:15 p. m., claims the election of Stuart, Republican, for Governor, by more than 100,000 plurality and the election of Rotan, Republican, for District Attorney of Philadelphia, by 40,000.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Nov. 6.—At the closing of the polls to-night leaders of all parties stated that an unexpectedly large vote had been polled in Allegheny county. It was estimated that from 93 to 97 per cent. of the registered vote in Pittsburg, Allegheny and McKeesport had been gotten out. First returns indicate Emery, Fusion-Democrat, slightly ahead of Stuart, Republican, for Governor.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Nov. 6.—Republican Chairman Ford said to-night: "Stewart will carry Allegheny county by from 25,000 to 28,000 majority. Congressman Dalzell will be elected, but his majority will be only 3,500 and Goehring for District Attorney will have a majority of 5,000 in the county."

PITTSBURG, Pa., Nov. 6.—Allegheny county returns, although slow, indicated at 11:30 o'clock tonight that Stuart, Republican, for Governor, had carried Allegheny county by 20,000 majority. The entire Republican ticket has been elected with the exception of district attorney, on which office Thompson, Fusion, is running about even with Goehring, Republican. The four Republican Congressmen have been elected by good majorities, and Mr. Dalzell, who was strongly opposed by organized labor, will have a majority of at least 5,000 votes. The legislative members for this county will all be Republican except the Third district, where the Fusion ticket won by a small majority.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Nov. 6.—The four Republican State Senators have been elected in Allegheny county. Their majorities are estimated as follows: Charles H. Kilne, 35th district, 2,000; Elliot Rodgers, 42d district, 5,000; Joseph A. Langfelet, 44th district, 2,000.

PITTSBURG, Nov. 6.—The Pittsburg Gazette-Times, Republican, claims Allegheny county for the Republican ticket by 20,000. The Post, Democratic, concedes the election of the entire Republican ticket in the county, but refuses to give any figures.

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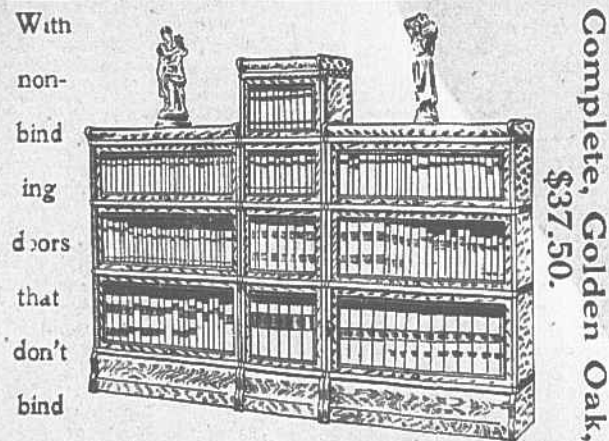
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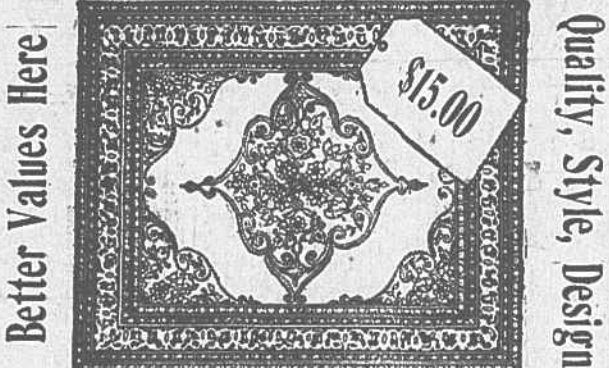
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
