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The Greatest Service Yet

WAS THE ONE HELD LAST NIGHT AT THE CENTRAL CHRISTIAN CHURCH.

Evangelist Shearer's sermon on "Did Christ Rise From the Dead?" was most logically handled and the Scriptural evidences were most conclusive to all reasonable minds.

"If Christ is not risen, then is our preaching vain, then are we found false witnesses of God and ye are yet in your sins, and all they that are asleep are perished."

Then is it a fact that all the coming generations will go down into the dark valley of death, hopeless, if that is true, we had just as well throw away this Bible; if there is no hope you run the risk of being lost, and if, for then there is nothing worth living for, if Christ is not risen.

How many drunkards lifted out of the gutter? How many fallen women has it saved? How much joy or happiness has it brought to the world?

When I see a man going among the cannibals of darkest Africa to save the lost and teach them Christ is Saviour. When I see a woman loved in prayer beside the fallen girl; when I see loved ones going into the region and shadow of death; when my heart aches and I reach for the hand that has vanished; when I hear Jesus say, "I am the resurrection and the life," I thank God that I am not an infidel.

When infidelity can not show one square mile that it has made pure and clean or one life brighter it should forever hang its head in shame. Believers and unbelievers agree that Jesus lived, was tried in Jerusalem, was crucified on the cross of Calvary, that he was buried in the tomb of Joseph of Arimathea, but where do they disagree? In that he rose from the dead.

Would you accept the testimony of sleeping men? Would any court receive such testimony? Listen, sixty sleeping soldiers! One soldier sleeps under penalty of death would be a miracle. Sixty would intensify the miracle; then unbeliever must believe sixty miracles to cause an infidel in the resurrection.

LIEUT. PEARY IS SAFE

ARCTIC STEAMER ROOSEVELT REACHED CHATEAU BAY, LABRADOR, LAST EVENING.

HALIFAX, N. S., Nov. 16.—A dispatch from Chateau Bay, Labrador, announces the arrival there at six o'clock last evening of the Arctic steamer Roosevelt, with Commander Peary aboard, which had been delayed by heavy weather further up the coast.

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WILL LEARN ALL HE CAN ABOUT BIG UNDERTAKING

PANAMA, Nov. 16.—President Roosevelt is to-day making an inspection of the work at Panama. He rested yesterday and took a day off from active examination of the work owing to a heavy rain which made it next to impossible to go over the ground. He set out at seven o'clock this morning on his tour of inspection. The early hours of the President's visit were devoted largely to exchange of courtesies with Panama officials. These were completed with a ball given by President Anador, in honor of the American President at the Commercial club. He has fretted at the delay necessitated by several engagements, but has lost no opportunity to acquire information and inquiries of every one for the moment.

Mysteriously Shot

WAS THE YOUNG MAN WHO BETRAYED A GIRL—RECEIVED BULLET FROM AMBUSH.

BECKLEY, W. Va., Nov. 16.—Fred O'Neill was shot Sunday night near his home in the Bryson neighborhood and while he is not yet dead, it is thought he cannot recover. O'Neill was coming home and when passing a bridge he was fired upon from ambush, the bullet entering his left side, passing through his body directly below his heart.

She Followed Her Husband

AND FOUND HIM IN COMPANY WITH ANOTHER WOMAN—A TRAGEDY FOLLOWED.

CHARLESTON, Nov. 16.—Finding her husband in a house with Miss Lucy Brown, Mrs. John Brooks, crazed with jealousy, emptied a revolver at the couple. Three bullets struck Miss Brown in the breast, hand and arm and she is fatally injured.

Shawkey Resigns

AS CHIEF CLERK TO STATE SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT BECAUSE OF COUNTY ELECTION.

CHARLESTON, Nov. 16.—Chief Clerk M. P. Shawkey, of the State superintendent of schools office, who was elected county superintendent of schools of Kanawha at the recent election, has resigned his position at the State house to take effect January 1st. His successor will be Prof. L. L. Friend, formerly principal of the University preparatory school at Keyser.

ASHEVILLE, N. C., Nov. 16.—John Harris, the negro wanted here for five murders, and hunted unceasingly for two days, was shot to death by a posse, which came upon him in George W. Vanderbilt's Blinnore property. He was pursued miles into a swamp, where he made a desperate fight. As he fled he turned at intervals and fired on his pursuers. Hundreds of shots were exchanged.

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STUDENTS AND FACULTY CLASH AT HUNTINGTON

Thirteen Young Men Suspended

Marshall College Boys Play Football With High School Boys and Get Into Serious Trouble.

SOUGHT TO EVADE ORDER OF THE FACULTY.

Pretty Girls on the Ground Ready to See the Game Was Too Great a Temptation for the Boys.

HUNTINGTON, Nov. 16.—As the result of a difference of opinion between members of the faculty of Marshall College and thirteen young men, students of that institution, the latter was suspended from roll call Wednesday morning and it remains to be seen what further steps will be taken in the matter.

Plainly stated, the young men are charged with an infraction of discipline, and the situation, while not likely to end seriously for the students, is one of extreme delicacy and has created a strong degree of interest in all departments of the big school.

The primary cause of the trouble was football. It appears that a number of the young men of Marshall College had arranged to play a game of football with the Huntington High school team at the Huntington Driving Park, after school hours Tuesday.

The college regulations, with reference to this sport, are necessarily somewhat restrictive, and the members of the faculty are compelled to watch rather sharply in order to protect the institution from the consequences which might result from any violation of the regulations.
