A GIRL DOCTOR

MISS BULLARD SOLE WOMAN IN VIRGINIA WHO HAS HOSPITAL POSITION.

Dr. Irene B. Bullard, of Radford, recently appointed by the general hospital board as third assistant physician at the Eastern State Hospital for the Insane, Williamsburg, is the only woman physician in the State, and probably in the South, holding a government position.

Dr. Bullard is pretty and yet in her twenties. Though her social standing is high, she cares nothing for gaudes, but has been a bookworm from a child, reading literature far beyond her years, while other girls played with dolls.

Dr. Bullard graduated from Wadsworth High school, Radford, at an early age. She attended a school at Madison, Wis., afterward taking a professional course at Farmville, this State. She taught for three years in the public schools of Pulaski county after her graduation.

Lured by the science of medicine, she gave up the thought of sweethearts and balls, and in time, obtained her degree as a doctor. To do this, she first became a trained nurse for several years, obtaining valuable experience.

She afterward began her medical education at the Boston Medical School, where she spent a year before entering the Medical School of the University of Michigan, at Ann Arbor. After three years at this institution she was graduated with high standing, after which she practiced with signal success for two years at Birmingham, Ala. Later she returned to her native State and took up her life work among her own people.

She is called into important consultation by the oldest and wisest practitioners in Pulaski county, all of whom hold her in high regard because of her learning and ability as a physician. Her work among the women and children of Radford has been phenomenal.

Dr. Bullard is the youngest daughter of Mrs. Meta G. Bullard and the late Daniel Bullard, who settled in Virginia before the civil war. Though a native born Virginian, she comes of Puritan stock, uniting the energy and progressive traits of the Yankee with the warm heartedness and generous impulsiveness of the south.

WILL RESIDE IN HUNTINGTON

WIDOW OF LEWIS A YEAGER WILL RETURN TO HER FATHER'S HOME.

MORGANTOWN, Dec. 21.—Mrs. Elizabeth Harvey Yeager, widow of the late Lewis Armstrong Yeager, and her brother, John Harvey, left Morgantown this morning for Huntington, where Mrs. Yeager will make her home with her parents. Mr. and Mrs. B. M. Yeager, parents of the deceased, left on the six o'clock train last evening for their home at Marlinton.

The affairs of the deceased have been pretty well settled up, and it is the desire of the widow to go to her home as soon as possible. Mr. Yeager left a will, written in his own hand on June 11, 1906, without witnesses, in which he gives his wife all the residue of his estate, after the payment of debts and funeral expenses and the payment of \$300 to his brother's two children, which is to be placed on interest until they reach their majority. Mr. Yeager is said to have left an estate valued at between \$5,000 and \$8,000, most of which is in coal and timber lands, insurance, and building and loan association stock.

Swearingen, trustee in the deed of trust of February 12, 1906, described in plaintiff's bill and ascertain what property of the defendant firm of Charles E. Hunter & Co. came into his hands as such trustee, what disbursements, if any, and what still remains in his hands as such trustee.

"Second. He shall ascertain the personal property owned or claimed by the said Charles E. Hunter and Lewis J. Lough individually, or as partners of said firm of C. E. Hunter & Co.; also what real estate, if any, is owned by the said Charles E. Hunter and Lewis J. Lough, the state and condition of the bills thereto.

"Third. He shall ascertain the debts of the firm of C. E. Hunter & Company which are liens against the funds or property in the hands of said trustee, or any liens against any other property owned by said Charles E. Hunter and Lewis J. Lough, by whom held, their respective amounts and priorities.

"Fourth. He shall ascertain what real estate is owned by the defendant, Florence Hunter, and whether or not the same is liable for the payment of any of the debts of the said C. E. Hunter & Company.

"Fifth. And such other matters as any party in interest may require, the same being pertinent, or such as said commissioner himself may deem pertinent whether so required or not."

Now, the above mentioned parties, both plaintiffs and defendants, and each of them, and all others interested, are hereby notified that I have fixed on Saturday, the 22d day of December, 1906, as the time, and my law office in the city of Fairmont, Marion county, West Virginia, as the place, for executing said decree and order of reference, and for hearing the parties and all persons interested, and taking evidence pertaining to the same, at which time and place you and each of you are required to attend.
