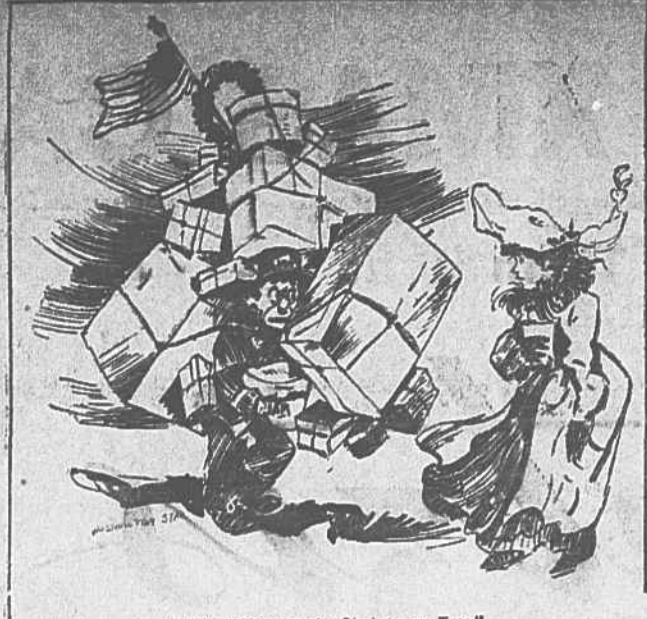

## NEW YORK WILL NOT BE TIED UP

AMICABLE AGREEMENT REACHED BETWEEN RAILROADS AND SWITCHMEN. RAISE OF FOUR CENTS AN HOUR WILL BE GIVEN THE MEN IF POSSIBLE A FURTHER RAISE WILL BE MADE IN A MONTH.

NEW YORK, Dec. 21.—As a result of the conference between the officials of the several railroads entering New York, and the higher officials of the Brotherhood of Trainmen and Switchmen, the railroads have agreed to grant a general increase in wages. They have promised to meet the claims of the men within a month, if possible, and agree to pay an increase of four cents, an hour immediately.

State Labor Commissioner, Sherman, member of the State Board of Arbitration, Railway and Union officials discussed the situation fully before the plan was fully agreed upon that has averted the contemplated strike.

Met More Than Half-Way.  
Grand Master Morrissey, of the train men, at his hotel said: "Our union made a demand of five cents per hour increase in wages. The various proposition more than half way and offered an increase of 4 cents per hour, the increase to date from December first. The question of the additional one cent asked for by the men was left for by the men was left for arbitration, and it will follow the usual course.

Got a Raise.  
Speaking of the conference, he said: "All the railroads with the exception of the Long Island railroad add to the four cents per hour raise. The Staten Island railroad differences were settled amicably on the 4 cent basis for the reason that the Staten Island railroad company had already given the men a raise of one cent per hour some time ago, so that with the granting of the additional four cents asked for, the company has given the men all that they demanded."

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## WOMAN'S WIFE TO TELL STORY

WHY NICOLAI DE RAYLAN PASSED AS A MAN TO BE REVEALED IN CHICAGO—WAS REALLY A RUSSIAN WOMAN OF NOBLE BIRTH WHO FLED IN DISGRACE—DONNED MALE ATTIRE IN AMERICA TO CONCEAL HER IDENTITY.

CHICAGO, Dec. 24.—Why Nicolai De Raylan posed for years as a man, although really a Russian woman of noble birth is to be told in the probate court, it is said, within a few days. The explanation will be made by Anna Davidson, a chorus girl, who married De Raylan two years ago. Miss Davidson is reported to have been taken into De Raylan's confidence but is now forced to tell the real story that Harry George De Raylan, the dead woman's son, may come into his inheritance. This boy has been known as Mrs. De Raylan's son by a former marriage.

The story as it has leaked out, is that De Raylan, the daughter of a Russian admiral, fled to this country following the secret birth of a son 13 years ago. Harry De Raylan is a few months more than 13 years old. In this country De Raylan donned man's attire, secured employment as a clerk in the Russian consulate in Chicago, married, was divorced, married again, held a commission in a Chicago militia company, sought to enlist in the volunteer service during the Spanish-American war and died recently of consumption at Phoenix, Ariz.

Sex Revealed.  
It was then that her sex was revealed. But for her death far from home her secret would have gone to the grave with her. Her will provides that Mrs. Anna De Raylan shall prepare the body for burial, and a few hours before her death she urgently asked that Mrs. De Raylan be sent for. De Raylan left an estate valued at \$10,000 or \$15,000, of which one-third goes to Mrs. De Raylan, and the rest to her "beloved son."  
The court demands proof of death and it will be impossible to show that a dead woman is the decedent unless the secret of her life is told.

WEST VIRGINIA PROPOSES TO BUILD ONE AT JAMESTOWN FOR THE EXPOSITION.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 24.—The West Virginia commission which has in charge the exhibit that is to be made at the Jamestown exposition, convened Saturday at Senator Elkins' committee room at the capitol. Among those present were ex-Senator Davis, former Governors Atkinson and Fleming, State Superintendent of Schools Miller, State Historian Lewis, and Messrs. Stanton and Robinson. The commission will open bids today for furnishings for the State building. A feature of the exhibit will be a pyramid of coal one hundred feet high, showing strata of the various kinds of coal mined in West Virginia.
