SAYS GEN. BOGGS, AT THE JAMESTOWN EXPOSITION—PROUD OF STATE. CHARLESTON, W. Va., June 6.—

"We have eclipsed the efforts of all other States with the celebration of West Virginia day at the Jamestown exposition," declared General E. L. Boggs, private secretary to the Governor.

Speaking of the reception tendered Secretary of the Treasury George B. Cortelyou by Governor and Mrs. Dawson, General Boggs stated that it was the most successful function of the kind yet held at the exposition.

There were a number of guests from Georgia, the Carolinas, Virginia and other States, but about half of the guests were West Virginians.

The dedication of the huge coal column was quite an event. This tall shaft, towering over 120 feet in the air, attracts attention for miles around.

General Boggs was quite favorably impressed with Secretary Cortelyou, as were all the other West Virginians who made his acquaintance.

Kingwood Hotel Destroyed by Fire

LEADING HOSTELRY BURNED TO GROUND CAUSING LOSS OF \$14,000.

GRAFTON, July 6.—Word was received in the city Thursday to the effect that the Hotel Gorcon at Kingwood, the finest hostelry of that city had been entirely consumed by fire early in the morning at a loss to the owner of the building of about \$10,000 and to the manager of the place who had it leased, of between \$3,000 and \$4,000.

From what could be learned of the fire, no one seems to know what caused it. It was discovered by some of the employees after it had gained such headway that it was impossible to do anything toward extinguishing the flames and as there is no fire department and no water works there nothing could be done except to save the adjacent property, but as there was nothing very close to the hotel, the loss outside of it did not amount to much.

The entire town was at the fire within a few minutes after the alarm was given and the men and boys worked hard carrying water but it was not of the least use, for the flames had gained such headway the small amount of water they could put on the blaze was of no consequence. It was a very hot fire, the building being entirely of wood and plaster and it burned just like a box of tinder.

The hotel which was a three story affair and one of the most handsome buildings in the town was bought a short time ago by S. A. Pratt who paid something like \$10,000 for the property. C. W. Sandridge was running the hotel and he lost practically all the stuff he had in it and his loss will be heavy.

It is likely now there will be an agitation for water works and some fire protection for Kingwood and that some improvements will be made in the near future.
