Two weeks ago he purchased the store from Kasser. He was 25 years of age and had many warm friends during his brief residence here, being liked by all who met him. Mr. Hartley is survived by his wife and an 18 months' old son, and his mother, who are all living in Moundsville. They came here on the 5:53 a. m. train to take charge of the body. They will probably leave for Moundsville with the body on the 8:40 p. m. train. The body was taken charge of last night by Undertaker Jenkins & Brown and removed to their rooms.
