Copper was unchanged at 29¢ for spot in the London market, but futures declined £1 10 to £87. Locally the market was weak and quotations were largely nominal, with lake quoted at \$21¢, electrolytic at \$20.50 to \$21¢, casting at \$20 to \$20.50. Lead was unchanged in both markets. Spelter was weak at \$6.05 to \$6.10 in the local market, and unchanged at \$24 in London.

Iron was higher in the London market, with standard foundry quoted at 56s 3d and Cleveland warrants at 56s 6d. Locally the market was without further change.
