IMPORTANT SESSION OF COUNCIL TONIGHT

TWO BOND ORDINANCES ARE TO BE CONSIDERED. Amended Filtration Ordinance to Be Up Again—To Vote on New Election Precincts.

The official call for a special meeting of council to be held tonight was issued last evening by Mayor C. C. Schmidt. Two very important matters, the new filtration bond ordinance and the special street levy ordinance, are to be considered. In addition to these, it is absolutely necessary that action be taken on the report of the election committee and the new precinct ordinance. The Board of Control will present a num-

ber of business matters for consideration.

The filtration ordinance, as amended, will comply with the state laws on bond issue ordinances. The original ordinance, it will be recalled, was nullified through the fact that the date set for the bond election was the same as the general city election, which is contrary to a law passed in 1897. The provision of the law which requires that a bond issue ordinance must be considered at a regular meeting of council, will be complied with in the meeting tonight in an adjourned meeting of the regular session held two weeks ago.

The street levy bond ordinance, providing for the expenditure of \$124,000, will be recommended by the committee on streets, alleys and grades in its original form, with the estimate submitted by City Engineer Cook. The ordinance provides for the principal throughout without regard to ward lines. The new precinct ordinance

provides for three new election precincts, one each for the Fourth, Seventh and Eighth wards.

VETERAN ANIMAL DIES
