The senior riverman stated that the committee took the trip at a time of the year when the conditions of the river were appalling, and that the big bucket was marooned several times, before reaching her destination. Rivermen are anxiously awaiting the action of this committee and are praying that the unfinished work is completed at once, so that navigation can be opened in summer.

## WHEELING HAS MANY STARTERS

LARGE FIELDS OF HORSES TO START HERE.

Col. Anderson Secures Cream of Horse World—Doings of Wheeling Horses on All Tracks.

Before the sun sets on the Island oval September 2 there will be 300 harness and running horses quartered in the stables that will start in the speed events the following week. Col. Robert Anderson, who has been attending the race meetings in Ohio and Pennsylvania, writes the writer that prospects for bringing to Wheeling a number of Grand Circuit stars this year are very encouraging, and that he already has secured at least 200 of the best horses in training. This early in the season this news will be received with much joy by the lovers of the harness horse.

The veteran speed secretary will return home Saturday from Cleveland, and he may then have the entries of many of the fastest trotters and pacers that started at North Randall, Ohio, in the late season. Early indications are that the coming race meeting will be by far the best in the 20 years of the West Virginia state fair.

Wheeling horses are figuring prominently on the turf this year. John, who won the Trot for all trot at Detroit, was beat by Eddie Archdale at North Randall, taking second money. The Wheeling bred trotter was not in condition, according to turf writers. She will bear watching the next time she meets the same field.

Grace, Jennie's stable mate, also met defeat at North Randall, being third to Soprano and Willy in the fastest trotted race of the year.

Minnie, once the pride of all West Virginia horsemen when she was the property of Col. Tom Davis, is rapidly getting into the cart horse class. The little daughter of The Imitator was a bad third to Alvin S. at Little Washington. Two years ago she beat him with ease and barely caused him to see the red flag. Fly-by-Night, a second rate, also beat Minnie. She has been having a hard life of late, being sold on several occasions.

Alvin S., who won the race, broke the Washington track record. He was a former Wheeling horse.

Robert Halpin, of this city, and Joe McMechen, of McMechen, who have their horses at Andis, will race them next week. Charlie King is again gone and has won twice this season.

## PYTHIAN PARADE BRILLIANT EVENT

THOUSANDS OF KNIGHTS TO BE IN LINE FOR PARADE.

Troops Will Arrive Tomorrow at Camp Shanley on the Island. Monday's Program.

Plumed knights attired in their dress parade uniforms will lead the spectacular parade Wednesday of next week, which will be the feature event of the Knights of Pythias convalescence which opens here Monday. Final arrangements for the parade have been completed, and it is expected that several thousand members of this order will be in line.

Living in the city and will at once be dispatched to Camp Shanley, on the State Fair grounds, where they will pitch their tents. By Monday morning the tented city will be occupied by hundreds and hundreds of Knights. In the evening Saturday special services will be held at the camp by one of the local ministers.

Wheeling will extend the hand of welcome to the visiting Knights and the city will have a gala aspect by Monday. Already half the business houses have been decorated and yesterday Secretary Schweitzer sent out letters to all members of the Business Men's Association, urging them to decorate their places of business for the affair.

The program for Monday has been arranged. In the forenoon all the troops arriving will be quartered, and by noon practically all will be quartered. Dedication ceremonies at Camp Shanley will start at 4 p. m. in the evening at 7 o'clock guard mount

will be conducted by the First Band. Band concerts will then be held, after which taps will be sounded for the first day's events.

Final arrangements for the big event have been completed by the local lodges, and all former records for attendance at State meetings are expected to be broken. Following the Knights of Pythias convention, the German soldiers will have their National convention, and then comes the big West Virginia State Fair.
