WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—That a man cannot get a position after he is forty years old was asserted before the Employment Commission by Arthur F. Holder, of the American Federation of Labor.

"The man who is over 40 and who has a few gray hairs cannot get back with the once lower his age, but he can hold on to his job as well as he can," he said.

ILLUSTRATES METHODS OF COOKING MEATS.
