SUNDAY HANDS IT OUT TO FOUR-FLUSHERS

Visiting Ministers Will Have to Take Their Chances With Other Sinners, the Evangelist Announced.

Let Your Light So Shine Before Men That They Will See Your Good Works, the Text of Afternoon Sermon.

ROOSEVELT BROKE FAITH

PROMISED LA FOLLETTE THAT HE WOULDN'T RUN. Wisconsin Man to Reveal Treachery of Colonel in His North Dakota Address.

WASHINGTON, March 13.—Stung to the quick by the treachery of Col. Roosevelt who broke faith with him he declares, Sen. La Follette left Washington today for North Dakota where he will tell of the affair. Sen. La Follette stated he had an explicit promise from Roosevelt, sent to him by Gifford Pinchot, that he would not be a candidate for president and would support La Follette. This message was delivered at a conference before La Follette became a candidate and was attended by Medill McCormick, Col. John Hannan, Walter Nausner and Pinchot. Upon this assurance La Follette says he entered the race. From now on the Senator declares it will be war to the knife, and the fact has been further heightened by the determination of Roosevelt to stump North Dakota. La Follette declares the men who advised him to enter the race have turned against him and are now supporting Roosevelt.

TAFT HAS 125 DELEGATES

TENNESSEE ADDS TWO MORE TO TAFT COLUMN. Fourth Congressional District Convention Lines Up Solid For President.

TAFT MEN TO FIGHT TO LAST DITCH IN THE OKLAHOMA STATE CONVENTION. NASHVILLE, Tenn., March 12.—The Republican Convention of the Fourth Congressional District at Lebanon, today, instructed for Taft, Delegate W. Smith, of Lafayette, and George T. Renfro, of Crossville.

THE DELEGATES NAMED TODAY BRINGS THE TAFT TOTAL UP TO 125, ALL OF WHOM ARE INSTRUCTED FOR THE PRESIDENT SAVE SEVEN. These seven are known to favor Taft. Cummins has 2 delegates so far and Roosevelt one. 539 delegates are necessary to nominate.

TAFT FORCES READY FOR FIGHT IN OKLAHOMA. GUTHRIE, Okla., March 13.—That Roosevelt supporters will control the State Republican convention which will meet here tomorrow, was admitted by leaders of the Taft forces, to-night. Roosevelt adherents will send a solid delegation of ten to the Chicago convention and favoring this the Taft Republicans say they will "fight to the last ditch."

A request by Federal Judge John R. Cotteral, that Charles E. Hunter resign as Federal District Clerk here, because of alleged "activity in politics," and Hunter's reply that Cotteral would have to "fire him, has created considerable stir in political circles. Hunter is president of the National Rough Riders Association.

TOPEKA, Kas., March 12.—Republican congressional committees in four Kansas districts held meetings today approved the convention plan of selecting delegates and adopted resolutions endorsing the administration of President Taft. The First, Third and Seventh districts were controlled by Taft men. The Second district committee favored primaries in the various counties.

Express Messenger Kills Two Texas Train Bandits

ABERIAL WRECK. Collision Between German Airships Results in Injury of Passenger.

Berlin, March 13.—A collision occurred today between two aeroplanes flying around the aerodrome at Johannisthal, the machine driven by Schade, who was carrying a passenger named Radowski, striking violently another aeroplane driven by Rottinger. Both the aeroplanes were smashed and fell to the ground, the passenger being injured, while the two airmen escaped unhurt.

SEN. ANDREWS FOUND GUILTY

ACCEPTED A BRIBE, DECLARES THE JURY. Second Conviction in Ohio Legislature Scandal of Over a Year Ago.

Columbus, O., March 13.—"Guilty as charged in the indictment" was the substance of the verdict returned this evening by a jury in the case of Senator La Forest R. Andrews, of Ironton, charged with having accepted a bribe of \$200 in connection with an insurance bill.

COURT ROOM IN TEARS. The scene which followed the reading of the jury's verdict was dramatic, almost tragic. Senator Andrews, who was apparently hoping for a favorable verdict, practically collapsed. Mrs. Andrews gave expression to her grief in unrestrained shrieks, while the aged father of the convicted legislator and the sons of the latter wept bitterly. Within a moment or so the entire court room was practically in tears. Many men, including attorneys of both sides, court attaches and dozens of spectators sobbed outright. It was some minutes before order was restored.

SENATOR ANDREWS WAS INDICTED ALONG WITH A DOZEN OTHER STATE LEGISLATORS AND ATTACHES MORE THAN A YEAR AGO AND HIS TRIAL AND CONVICTION FOLLOWED CLOSELY AFTER FINAL DISPOSITION OF THE CASE OF REDNEY J. DIEZEL, FORMER SENATE SERGEANT-AT-ARMS, WHO RECENTLY BEGAN A SENTENCE OF THREE YEARS UPON CONVICTION OF HAVING ABETTED THE WIBERY OF ANDREWS.

IT IS EXPECTED THAT THE TRIAL OF EX-SENATOR HUFFMAN, OF BUTLER COUNTY, ALSO CHARGED WITH HAVING ACCEPTED A BRIBE, WILL BE ENTERED UPON NEXT TUESDAY.

FOLLOWING THE HOFFMAN CASE THE INDICTMENT AGAINST SENATOR CETONE, OF LYON, ON A SIMILAR CHARGE WILL BE TAKEN UP.

1,000 KILLED

Italians Slaughter Arabs in Tripoli. Wounded Will Number a Thousand More. BENCHAZI, Tripolitania, March 13.—More than one thousand Arabs were killed and another thousand wounded, according to Italian advisers, in the course of one of the stiffest encounters of the war when the Italians yesterday stormed and captured two bases situated to the northeast of Fejat, which were strongly entrenched and held by a large force of Arabs. The Italian loss was 25 dead and 55 injured.

WINDOW GLASS MEN GET 35 PER CENT RAISE. Formal Announcement of New Wage Agreement Made From Pittsburgh Last Night.
