IRON AND STEEL

NEW YORK, July 14.—There has been a reasonable decrease in the volume of new orders for finished steel products after six months of unprecedented activity. The tendency of prices is still upward, however, after an advance of 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 per cent. on average. That specifications on a heavy tonnage are assumed in reasonable time. There is also a large volume of latent business. The Steel Corporation June statement indicated that shipments were 56,363 tons less than new orders, which aggregated 1,000,000 tons last month, while operations were 50 per cent of full capacity, a net gain of 15 per cent in six months.
