ENDORSE KRUPP

At Meeting of Republican Conference Saturday Night, Strong Resolutions Were Adopted.

It is understood generally that a large number of the conferees selected at the district meetings Saturday evening for the judicial convention to be held in this city in September, are in favor of the renomination of Judge H. C. Hervey of Brooke County, and the nomination of W. E. Krupp of this city. In Centre district, a resolution was passed endorsing Attorney W. E. Krupp and a similar resolution was passed in Clay district. While there was no endorsement of Mr. Krupp in any of the other districts the sentiment was very favorable to his selection.

If there is any sentiment for the endorsement of any Democratic candi-

date it was not visible at the district meetings, as all those attending seemed to be desirous of placing two strong Republicans on the ticket for the two judgeships. It is the calculation of both parties to re-elect Judge Hervey and it seems his reelection is assured under any circumstances.

LAND SHOW

Will be Considered at Meeting of the Executive Committee of West Virginia Board of Trade on Monday.

An important meeting of the executive committee of the West Virginia Board of Trade will be held in this city, Monday, August 26, when several matters relative to the Chicago Land Show will be considered.

The show opens November 23, and arrangements are progressing rapidly for the West Virginia exhibit. Arrangements will also be made for the annual meeting of the Board, which will be held in Morgantown, October 8 and 9. Notices of the meeting were sent out to the members of the committee yesterday by Secretary Roy B. Naylor.

BOND RESIGNS FROM LINSLEY

ACTION MADE KNOWN AT MEETING OF TRUSTEES YESTERDAY.

Mr. Bond Will Engage in Business, and His Successor Not Chosen—Other Matters are Considered.

At a meeting of the board of trustees of Linsley Institute, held yesterday, much business preparatory to the opening of the annual fall term was transacted, and it was decided to open the school for the ninety-eighth session, Wednesday morning, September 11th.

The resignation of Prof. Marcus Bond, who has been a member of the faculty for a number of years, was accepted and a committee composed of Dr. J. L. Dickey, Rev. Jacob Brittingham, D. D.; and Prof. William Melure, was appointed to select a person to fill the vacancy. The resignation of Prof. Bond came as a surprise and as yet no one has been suggested to take his place. He intends retiring from the profession of teaching and will enter business.

Prof. William T. Melure was re-elected principal and will have full charge of the institution during the coming year. Various reports and accounts were filed and carefully considered, and in addition, much routine business was transacted.

The building will be repaired and improvements of an extensive nature will be made. The rooms will be repapered and decorated, while the exterior will be re-painted.

The report showed the school to be in a flourishing condition, and the indications are that the next year will be one of the most successful in the history of the institution. An unusually large enrollment is expected this year. With the present faculty, and the courses offered, Linsley is rapidly becoming one of the foremost institutions of learning in this vicinity.

STOLEN MONEY IS RECOVERED

MOUNDVILLE MAN OVERJOYED AT THE RECOVERY.

Money Was Found in Room of the Man Who Was Arrested For the Crime.

Mrs. Harry McMullen, of Wellsburg, who was visiting her mother, Mrs. Ambrose Buzard of Moundsville, while rummaging through the wardrobe of the house yesterday afternoon shortly after one o'clock found the money that was stolen about two weeks ago from William Gray, a Scotchman, who was boarding at the Buzard home.

Officer Conley of Moundsville, was called and the money was turned over to him. He at once took the money to Prosecuting Attorney E. C. Carrigan at his office, where the money was counted and it was found that the pocket book contained 1075 or \$1 less than the amount claimed by Gray. There was three \$100 bills, thirteen \$20 bills, two \$10 bills, and eight \$1 bills. It will be recalled that Gray lost the money while asleep, and when he awoke during the night he found Jack McQuilland, in his room.

McQuilland has been held in the county jail at Moundsville awaiting a hearing before a squire. He was released from jail yesterday on his own recognizance to appear at a preliminary hearing the date to be fixed later.

Gray, was at work at the Panama coal mine south of the city and was notified about three o'clock that the money had been recovered and his joy can only be appreciated by the few who have had such experiences. The money was found in the wardrobe and Lewis, the other man who was released, slept and it is likely that McQuilland will be held in await the action of the next grand jury.

SECT. RUTZAHN

Of the International Tuberculosis Society, Will Be in City and Deliver Address

Announcement was made yesterday that E. G. Rutzahn, of Hyde Park, Chicago, field secretary of the International Tuberculosis Society, will arrive in this city Wednesday to spend three days in the interest of the fight against the white plague. While in the city he will deliver several talks on the disease, and will hold several conferences with persons who are interested in the work of exterminating tuberculosis.

Secretary Rutzahn is making a tour of the country under the auspices of the International Tuberculosis Society, which is proving one of the greatest factors in the anti-tuberculosis campaign, and he is one of the most active persons engaged in the work today. In a letter to the Associated Charities yesterday, he urged that several conferences with persons interested in the campaign and the public generally be arranged. He is especially anxious to meet teachers.

Mr. Rutzahn was in the city for a short time last March, and while here made many friends. He expects to remain in Wheeling until after Friday and it is likely that arrangements will be made to have him give several addresses before the public.
