Arrangements Completed. Arrangements have been completed for the Republican ward meeting to be held this evening in the various wards of the city for the purpose of naming delegates to the convention to be held tomorrow evening for the purpose of nominating a full city ticket to be placed in the field at the coming municipal election. The convention will be held in the Circuit court room at the court house on Tuesday and a large number of persons are expected to be present. The basis for selecting delegates is one for every ten votes cast for mayor in 1912, and the different wards of the city are entitled to the following: First ward, 17 delegates; Second ward, 29 delegates; Third ward, 17 delegates; Fourth ward, 12 delegates; Total 67. The ward meeting will be held in the following order: First ward, school house; Second ward, circuit court room; Third ward, circuit court room; Fourth ward, street house. All Republicans are earnestly requested to attend this evening and make the meeting a success.

May Have Special Meeting. It is probable that the mayor of this city will call a special meeting of the city council for today or one day this week for the purpose of accepting the sewer, which is said to have been completed. WINNING PRIZES Sunshine Orchards at Huntington, Owned by C. H. Dalzell, Are Very Successful.

Special Dispatch to the Intelligencer. HUNTINGTON, W. Va., Feb. 16.—The Sunshine Orchards, owned and managed by C. H. Dalzell, formerly of Wheeling, received two first prizes and one third prize on apples shown at the annual fruit show of the West Virginia State Horticultural society, held at Charleston January 22 and 23, 1913.

This is the second lot of prizes the Sunshine orchards have taken this season, having been awarded one first and two seconds at the annual fruit show of the College of Agriculture and Monongalia County Horticultural society, held at Morgantown December 5 and 9, 1912.

Mr. Dalzell's orchards are the latest in the southern end of the state and had an output of 2,500 barrels of apples last season. His orchards are being sprayed and cared for along the latest scientific methods.
