WHEELING INTERSTATE LEAGUE CLUB WILL BE SOLD TOMORROW

PRESIDENT DAWSON DECLARES IT IS ALMOST CERTAIN.

Local Fans Will Take Over the Club From Owners Robinson and Anderson.

The deal for the sale of the Wheeling baseball club is four-fifths finished, says the parting remark of President Charles A. Dawson, of the Interstate league, as he boarded the Pennsylvania train Saturday evening for his headquarters at Zanesville, O.

President Dawson met with a number of baseball enthusiasts Saturday afternoon at the board of Trade rooms and talked over the matter, answered all questions and put it right up to them, that something would have to be done to keep baseball in Wheeling, as Owner Errol V. Robinson refuses to continue and Great Anderson, a part owner, has already quit.

It is not known what the price of the ball club will be. President Dawson talked over the assets of the club with those present and at a round figure set a price of what he thought it would be worth. Dawson is a timberman and can easily estimate the cost of the construction of a ball park. He said that at the price, timber is today, it would cost \$5,000 to build an enclosure and stands on the grounds, the local club has been playing for the past number of years.

Players' Worth. A glance at the roster of the Wheeling club will find, catcher Welch, Pitchers, Graham, Clark, Humphries, Richardson and probably one or two other recruits, fielders, Steinberg, Steinbrinner, Gray, Nasher and Levin, outfielder, Murn. These players are a fine asset.

With these things and many minor assets, the club is worth at least \$5,000.

If the club is purchased, it is probable that a few men will set up the necessary cash to release Robinson of the club and then a stock company will be formed. It is understood that the company will be chartered at \$10,000 and 400 shares of stock will be issued at \$25 a share. This is the plan that was followed by the Erie and Akron clubs and the full amount was forthcoming. Steubenville has now adopted the same plan.

Tuesday afternoon a meeting will be held to the men, who are enthusiastic regarding the purchase of the club. Every fan who desires to be present and see that the deal is open

and above board can attend the meeting at the McLeure grill.

President Dawson will arrive here tomorrow noon and immediately go into session with the probable purchasers. If the deal is put through it is believed that Errol V. Robinson will be asked to remain and take charge of the club's affairs for the season.

WHEELING BOWLING DATES ANNOUNCED

SECRETARY LANGTRY GIVES LOCAL BOWLERS MARCH 3.

Six Wheeling Teams Are Entered—Intelligencer Team Will Bowl On Alley No. 12.

TOLEDO, O., Feb. 16.—The five man team entries for the thirteenth annual tourney of the American Bowling Congress from Wheeling have been allotted March 3. The teams will go on the alleys at 10:15 p. m.

This announcement was made today by A. L. Langtry, secretary of the American Bowling congress, when he finished compiling the schedule for the big event. Wheeling has six teams entered for the big prize.

The tournament will begin in the Terminal Auditorium on February 22 and continue until March 12. There will be one big feature, night to be known as "German Night" when bowlers from Cincinnati, Milwaukee and St. Louis will roll.

On the opening night Toledo bowlers will practically be in charge of the alley. There are 120 five man teams entered from this city. The formal opening of the tournament will be made by Mayor Brand Whitlock, who will address the bowlers. Judge Howard, president of the A. B. C., also will make an address. Following are the Wheeling entries with the number of the alleys on which they will roll:

In all likelihood this will be the last year that "poke" teams and clubs organized merely for the purpose of bowling in the big tournament will be allowed by the American Bowling Congress. Should the amendment proposed by President Howard of the A. B. C. be adopted all "poke" teams will be barred from competition in the annual tourney. Such a change will end the pretense of such clubs as the Brunswick Allstars of New York and similar teams, organized merely for the purpose of taking part in the A. B. C. tourney.

Some time ago Secretary Langtry received the amendment from Judge Howard, in which the A. B. C. had proposed that all teams not rolling in a league or established by the A. B. C. be barred from competition. Talk of course was aimed directly at the Brunswick Allstars, the crack New York team, composed of Smith, Dunbar, Lindsay, Hurdell and Hagan. For two years this club has competed in the big meets, and had earned quite a bit of prize money. At Chicago it won first money. It is on record again this year.

At first Secretary Langtry refused to accept this entry, claiming that it was not a regular competitive team, and was not a member of the city bowling association, affiliated with the A. B. C. At the eleventh hour Langtry received an affidavit from its managers, stating that the team was a member of the city bowling association, and had been in existence for more than two years. Not being able to question the affidavit, Langtry accepted of the club's entry, and has scheduled it for March 11.

There can be no mistaking the fact that the club has been in existence for two seasons, and the Allstars have been barred from all "poke" team

leagues and tournaments. It is only in the A. B. C. meet that they can compete in organized.

Should Howard's amendment be passed, as it no doubt will be, the All-Stars will be barred in the A. B. C. as well as in the east, unless they join a sanctioned league, which is not very likely, as none of the members of the team are friendly enough toward each other to entertain such a proposition. One had feature of the proposed amendment, however, is that it would kill all chances of pick-up teams, organized merely for the purpose of padding the entry list. This year, for instance, almost two-thirds of the entries from Toledo are so-called "poke" teams who entered the meet for the sake of rolling in a national tournament. Unless an amendment to the amendment is proposed and adopted, that pick-up-fives from the city holding the tourney be permitted to compete, the five man entries in future years may be sadly depleted.

President Howard's amendment will be considered at Toledo when the A. B. C. officers and delegates convene on February 25 and 26.

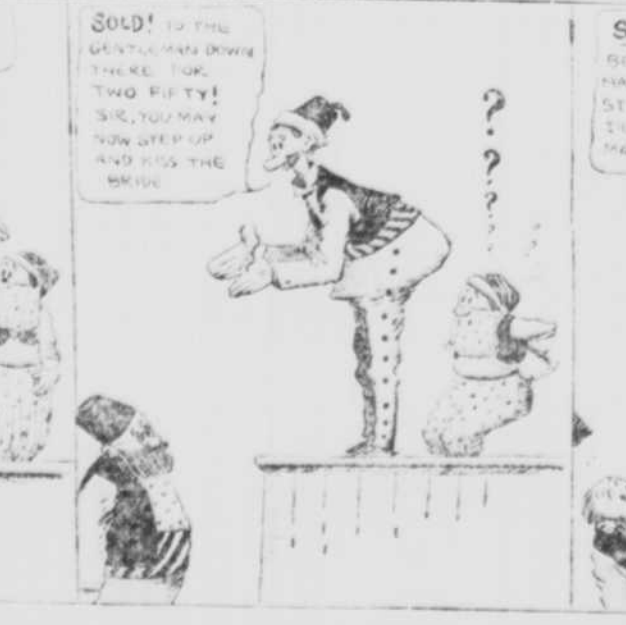
