ing, this being due to the fact that many of the voters were unable to get away from their work before that time. During this time there was a rush throughout the city to cast a vote for favorites, and judges and clerks were kept on the jump to keep up.

On the island the fight was especially warm because of the fact that both Mayor Kirk and Hal Bruus reside there. Their friends spent considerable time in getting out the vote, and the results justified the effort. This was the case practically throughout the city during the day.

Very little trouble was experienced in the city during the day, with the exception of in the second ward, where several arrests were made. In other portions of the city the election passed off quietly and was marked by clean work throughout.

Arrests Made.

Six arrests were made in the second ward yesterday, all being at Precinct No. 2 on Eleventh street. It is claimed that each of the men arrested was guilty of violation of the contract practice laws and will be given a hearing later. The majority of those arrested were released later in the afternoon upon furnishing bond. Defendant Sheriff Henry Frohne was arrested by Detective Ed. Starn on complaint of a judge in the precinct, who stated that he had caused considerable trouble in the election officials.

He was released shortly after when Sheriff Swanson said that he would stand good for him in case the matter is brought to trial. Assistant Prosecutor McKee was called in the case and advised that he would stand good for the defendant if no formal charge was made against him and the election officials were unable to leave the polls to do so.

"Chuck" Johnson, a former policeman, was also arrested and taken to police headquarters, but later let off when he put up bond of \$50 for his appearance for trial. The others were all released. Released today, Thomas Swanson, Marshal Ed. Starn, Sheriff Henry Frohne, and John J. McKee. Released by J. J. McKee, returned bond for each of the men with the exception of Frohne, who was remanded to jail to await the trial of William H. He will be given a hearing next Monday.

Tom Fallway was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Henry Frohne on a charge of having attempted to pass an illegal ballot. He was arraigned before Judge Gumpers who released him upon \$100 bond furnished by Louis Frohne. It is claimed that Fallway was arrested at the instance of Padgett supporters, has been a resident of heading for the past five years and that the charges against him are unfounded. He will be given a hearing tomorrow afternoon.

Mistake in Ballots. A mistake in printing the fourth ward ballots caused considerable trouble in the polls where many first ballots were printed and returned. The ballots were printed correct by down to the count-maintenance center where the words "Fourth Ward" should have been printed. The clerks certified this mistake by writing in the words "Fourth Ward" and it is said to be perfectly legal.

ITHACA, N. Y., May 22.—Special memorial services will be held Sunday in Sage Chapel at Cornell university for the four Cornell students, Brainard Bailey, Reinhardt A. Zimmer, Miss Martha A. McCormick and Miss Mary Corneilla Mallett, who are supposed to have been drowned Saturday night in a canoe accident. The whole university community will participate and until that time the flag on the library tower will be at half-mast. Semple music will be played on the campus.

THREE KILLED WHEN GUN LETS GO AT FORT

CHARLESTON, S. C., May 22.—Three men were killed and nine or more seriously injured tonight when the breech block blew off a 24-inch gun at Fort Moultrie, across the bay from Charleston. Private Peter Christian and two others of the coast artillery were killed, two others were injured and one seriously wounded. The men were at night practice when the tragedy occurred.

Captain Geo. H. H. Hays, who was standing with other officers near the gun, is said to have been seriously wounded. The explosion occurred at 10 o'clock tonight. Similar cutting of the scope resulted in serious damage to the gun. Reports are conflicting as to the exact number in which the accident occurred. Several of the wounded soldiers are believed to have sustained fatal injuries. An account of the details of the hot shot misfire details are available.
