THE city and county officials have the base ball fever, and will contest in a game some time next week. THIRSHALL of the Germania Singing Society corner Market and 14th Streets, was decorated and illuminated last night.

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CITY COUNCIL.—SECOND BRANCH.—A special meeting of Council was held last evening. Present in Second Branch: Adams, Campbell, Crowther, Fisher, Goodfellow, Hanes, Logan, Myles, Pollock, Reeves, Riddle, Simpson, Stoker and West.

THE special object of the meeting was stated to be the awarding of the contract for re-paving Market street, between 11th and 12th streets.

A subscription list of property owners along Market street, between 11th and 12th streets, amounting in the aggregate to \$500, was presented.

A petition from people residing on La Belle street, in relation to the Wheat's factory premises, and the decaying office thereon, was referred to the Committee on Public Works.

A petition of John G. Reister, for privilege of removing dirt, was granted. Petition of John Myers, claiming to be erroneously assessed, was referred to the Board of Equalization and Appeals.

A petition of Riverside Iron Works Company, for right of way for rail road, was referred to the Board of Public Works.

An ordinance authorizing the Riverside Iron Works Company to construct a rail road on the east side of Wood street, from its mill on said street south to the track of the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad Company, and to transport railroad cars thereon, subject to certain conditions and restrictions, was read three times and passed.

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YESTERDAY MORNING'S STORM.—Severe thunder storms have been of common occurrence in this locality the present season, but it has been a long time since we have seen so much vivid lightning and heard such heavy thunder as in the past few days.

The roof of the belfry of the Zane street M. E. Church was blown off, and falling in the street, occupied by a Mr. Moreland, about forty yards to the southeast. The roof of Mr. Moreland's house was badly damaged, and a large hole was broken through the ceiling of a bedroom occupied by Mrs. Moreland.

The residence and tobacco shop of Mr. Chris. Viewig, in the lower part of the Eighth Ward, was considerably damaged. The walls were forced apart so that the roof over one room was entirely demolished, and another roof hung supported only by the partition in the rear.

The jacksail and one of the swinging derricks of the steamer Andes were broiled in the street, and fell to the deck with a loud noise, alarming the crew and causing considerable excitement on board.

The top of the gable end of Tallman's grocery, in North Wheeling, was blown in. The office of the Superior Machine Works, in the West End, was also damaged. The trees and shrubbery in the West End Cemetery were injured to a considerable extent.

The Hayes and Wheeler pole in the lower part of the Eighth Ward was blown down. On the Island many fine fruit trees were destroyed.
