REPUBLICAN members of the Senate Finance Committee have found it possible to provide for a revision of the tariff which reduces the revenues but destroys no American industry.

The Mills bill reduces all the schedules over 23 per cent. Three schedules it does not touch at all. The reduction on the schedules affected is 27 per cent.

Potatoes Put on the Free List. Something must have happened to the advocates of the Mills bill, or they would not have the effrontery to deny that the bill put potatoes on the free list. The present duty is 15 cents a bushel.

Our home farmers will be interested to see to what extent foreign potatoes have competed with their own product in their own market within the past ten years. The following statement is taken from the official reports of the United States Treasury Bureau of Statistics:

It will be seen from those large imports in the fiscal year just closed enormous—that the duty of 15 cents a bushel has been far from prohibitory. What are the imports of potatoes likely to be—what the competition with the home product—with the reasonable duty entirely removed?

Last spring Wheeling produce dealers were paying 90 cents a bushel for home grown potatoes delivered in this city. Scotch potatoes began to come in at 60 cents a bushel delivered in Wheeling, ocean freight, railroad freight and the duty of 15 cents a bushel all included in the 60 cents. The Scotch potatoes knocked the bottom out of the Wheeling market, and home grown potatoes had to take their chances at 60 cents a bushel along with the Scotch, the domestic article having the preference at the same price.

The Mills bill reduces the average rate of Duty on Dutiable Goods 23.86 Per Cent. Mr. Mills claims that his tariff bill which passes the House of Representatives reduces the average rate of duty on dutiable goods imported in the fiscal year 1887 from 47.10 per cent to 42.49 per cent—a reduction, as he says, of 4.61 per cent, and this he says is not Free Trade. Certainly it is not; but does Mr. Mills tell the whole truth? Emphatically he does not. Here are the proofs.
