Honored Railroad Change.

It is rumored now that the new management of the Cleveland & Lorain road contemplate cutting off the passenger train service to this city on account of inability to secure facilities here. For a year or more the trains that run into Bellaire have been returned to Bridgeport for attention because there was no place to leave them standing here. Then they have to run down here again to start out on their regular runs. This inconvenience the management contemplate cutting off, so that there will be less useless passing of trains over the river branch of that road. The city of Bellaire can ill afford to have this done, as there is no more valuable feeder to the city than the C. L. & W., and in addition to its importance in this regard it has made other roads more useful to all the industrial interests here.

VERY PECULIAR ACTION.

An Ohio Officer brings an Alleged Insane Man here.

Yesterday afternoon a telegram was received from Powhatan, Ohio, at police headquarters, announcing that a lunatic was on the afternoon Ohio River train in charge of an officer, and asking that officers be sent to the depot to assist in looking after him. Officers Lukens and Gaus were detailed on the job and met the train.

H. P. Willetts, the town marshal of Powhatan, was on the train, and with him was Charles Larnier. Willetts turned the man over to the officers, and when asked what he would like done with Larnier, replied that he wanted them to take care of him. The officers thought that a rather peculiar proceeding, but took him up to the county building, where a committee of the county commissioners was in session. Mr. McGregor, the member of the board who looks after such matters, and the officers, asked Larnier a number of questions, all of which he answered very satisfactorily. He comes from Westmoreland county, Pa., and was raised on a farm. He says he does not like to work in the hot sun, that it does not agree with his health and that he came here in the hope of getting a job as fireman on a railroad locomotive. Larnier talked very sensibly, though it could be seen that he had not been off the farm a great while and that he was not much posted in the ways of the world, but he showed no signs of insanity whatever. Mr. McGregor thought perhaps if he would make the effort, he might find employment on a locomotive over in Bridgeport, and accordingly directed him there.
