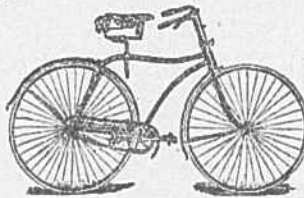

Yesterday Joseph Doyle was handling nail legs in a South Side factory, when one fell against his hand and washed a finger, the second on his right hand. He went to Dr. John R. Pines and the doctor amputated it. About a year ago he lost two fingers off the same hand.

Commodore Fishing Club.

The Commodore Fishing Club will give a grand turtle soup lunch this evening at their boat house at the foot of Thirty-eighth street. The Southside alley band will furnish music. After the lunch, is all gone the boat will put off and float about twenty miles down the river to Salt River station, where the club will camp.

The Barbers' Guests.

A telegram was received yesterday announcing that the Pittsburgh barbers' delegation expected to leave Pittsburgh on the 8:30 train to-morrow morning, with fifty members. The arrangements for feeding the multitude expected in Benwood to-morrow have all been perfected. A big turnout of barbers of Wheeling and vicinity is expected. It is hoped that a union may be organized.

City Medical Society.

The City Medical Society met last night at the Public Library, with Drs. Myers, Reed, Dickey, Wilson, Frissell, Stifel, Baguley, Hazlett and Campbell present. The secretary was instructed to gather together all the records of the society and all the specimens belonging to it. Hitherto the records have not been preserved in the archives of the society, each secretary retaining his records when his term expired. An effort will be made to get them all together, and on September 25 the society will again meet, reorganize and start in with vigor.

To Go to Europe.

The session of the First Presbyterian church met last evening and most cordially and thoughtfully moved that the vacation of their pastor be so extended that he might have time to take a voyage to Europe; hence, Dr. Cunningham and his wife will sail for Scotland on the Fourth of July in the steamer Ethiopia, Anchor line, to be absent until the second week of September. The following ministers will supply the pulpit of the First church on the Sabbath mornings of July: Rev. L. W. Barr, of Bellair, first Sabbath; Rev. H. N. Campbell, of Martin's Ferry, second Sabbath, and Rev. C. M. Alford, of the Third church of Wheeling, the third and fourth Sabbaths.

Before Squire Davis.

Mrs. Clay Ann Slater, of North Wheeling, was arrested at 9 o'clock Thursday night on a peace warrant sworn out by Mrs. Jennie Deiters. Mrs. Slater furnished bond for \$50 to keep the peace. Mrs. Slater then swore out two warrants against Jennie Deiters, one for threatening to hit her with a hatchet, the other for profane swearing. Mrs. Deiters was arrested at 10 o'clock at night and placed in jail. She had a hearing yesterday evening and was fined \$1 and costs for profanity and swearing. On the other charge she was required to furnish a bond for \$50, and promised Squire Davis to have one ready this morning.

To Change His Field of Work.

Rev. W. R. M. Denny, the Bible missionary, will visit the Sabbath schools on the Island on Sabbath afternoon and lecture to the pupils on the Bible missionary work, and exhibit the New Testament, printed in raised letters for the use of the blind.

Rev. Mr. Denny has tendered his resignation to the Wheeling and Ohio County Bible Society, and has accepted a position as Sabbath school missionary of the Presbytery of Cairo, Ill. Mr. Denny has done good and efficient work here, and the society is loth to accept the resignation of so faithful and diligent a man. Mr. Denny's new position is probably one in which his work can be extended over a larger field, and where the labors will be as prolific of good.

At Clerk Hook's Office

Clerk Hook yesterday admitted to record three deeds of trust and a deed made June 26 by James Cummins and wife to Henry Auber, in consideration of \$3,000, for lot G in square 23, on the east side of Jacob street below Thirty-fifth. Also a deed made June 24 by Samuel Nesbitt, sr., and wife to Thomas M. Dorsey, in consideration of \$1,000, for a lot on the east side of Woods street in the Sixth ward.

A marriage license was issued to August Heune, aged 22, and Louisa Seabright, aged 21, both of Wheeling. The last will of Katherine Kull, deceased, was offered for probate, and the hearing set for July 3.

John J. Bayha qualified as executor of the will of P. W. Lindemann, deceased, and gave bond in the sum of \$20,000, no security being required.
