SUICIDE OF GOV. MOREHOUSE. The Missouri Statesman Cut His Throat With a Pocket Knife.

MARYSVILLE, Mo., Sept. 23.—Ex-Governor Albert H. Morehouse committed suicide at his residence at 9 o'clock this morning. Several weeks ago the Governor was violently overheated while driving cattle and has been very nervous since. He was taken a drive by a friend last night, but became so excited that a physician was called and a watch stationed at his bedside. This morning it was found he had cut his throat with a pocket knife. Governor Morehouse was born in Delaware county, Ohio, and was a prominent lawyer and politician in this State. He was elected lieutenant governor on the Democratic ticket in 1884, with John S. Marmaduke as governor, and upon the death of the latter succeeded him as governor. His wife and two of his children are in St. Joseph.

TRADE SCHOOLS. To be Established in Massachusetts—A Sensible Agreement Reached.

BOSTON, Mass., Sept. 23.—An understanding in relation to trade schools has been arrived at by the Mason Builders' Association and the Bricklayers' Union. It is the first instance in the history of the labor movement in New Engl and that a trade union and an organization of employers have agreed upon this question. Trade schools are to be established and opened evenings. All regular indentured apprentices are to be given instruction therein. None but regular apprentices shall be allowed to enter these schools. All pupils shall be given instruction in the theory and science of trade they propose to learn.

General Siegel's Son Pardoned. WASHINGTON, Sept. 23.—June 3rd last the President granted a pardon to Robert Siegel, son of General Siegel, of New York, convicted of forgery and sentenced to six years imprisonment at hard labor, the pardon to take effect at

the expiration of two years and nine months of actual imprisonment. To-day the President granted a full pardon in view of the extreme illness of the prisoner and the fact that his term will expire in December.

MOUNDSVILLE LOT SALE. A Great Day in the New Old Town—The Sales on the First Day Aggregate About \$75,000.

The progressive movement at Moundsville reached its zenith yesterday. It was the first day of the lot sale and a great crowd was present, estimated at 3,000 people. Specials from Pittsburgh and Wheeling brought large crowds. The city was in gala attire and the enthusiasm knew no bounds. Dozens of conveyances met all trains and conveyed the visitors to the grounds free of charge, this being a free offering by the people, as was also the dinner. As the people arrived they were driven to the grounds, and at one o'clock p. m. the sale began. The interest ran high, yet the company made every effort to keep things on a sound basis. Lots were knocked down without dwelling long in order to keep prices where they ought to be. At one o'clock the stentorian voice of Major Beckenbaugh was heard and the first lot was up. The people packed themselves close to the stand and stayed there during the whole of the sale. The interest did not abate, but was as buoyant at the close as at the start. Last evening everybody was enthusiastic and the streets presented a lively appearance. The Mound City cornet band discoursed lively airs from the court house square. The prospects for the second day of the sale are splendid, and a large crowd of people will be present. Among the choicest lots in the plat will be offered to-day.
