

METHODISTS ADJOURN.

Meeting of the Conference of the M. E. Church South

AND AN INTERESTING SESSION

At Ashland, Kentucky—One of the Best Meetings in the History of the Conference of West Virginia—The Appointments for the Coming Year. The Ministers Who Drew the Prizes.

Special Dispatch to the Intelligencer.

ASHLAND, Ky., Sept. 13.—The fortieth session of the Western Virginia conference of the M. E. church, south, which opened here on the 6th inst., closed yesterday after one of the most interesting sessions yet on record.

The first day's work ended with the referring of the following names to the committee on conference relations for superannuated relation: R. A. Claughton, W. Brisco, G. S. McCutcheon; S. Black, C. S. Merrill, J. T. Johnson and J. K. Hedges.

The second day's session began with the admission of S. X. Swimme, of Paintsville, and Ernest Robinson, of West Virginia.

Revs. I. N. Fannin, A. A. Hollister, H. B. Bell, J. B. F. Yeak and D. H. Ried reported and were continued in the class of the second year.

Under question seven the following deacons were called and advanced to the class of the fourth year: F. M. Canfield, J. D. Stalnaker, S. A. Donahue, P. D. Nutter, J. W. Crite, K. J. Bevins and T. R. Houghton.

The following travelling preachers were then elected deacons: W. C. Woodyard, B. C. Davis, A. E. Odell, C. H. Burns, W. U. Fugate and M. E. Peck, K. R. H. Edens were continued in the class of the second year.

The resignations of the Revs. T. S. Wade and B. F. Goaling, of the board of directors of the Barboursville college were then accepted, and C. C. Brown, J. W. Lambert and J. A. Black were appointed to fill vacancies.

The fourth day began with business of small interest, the first real business of importance being the election of delegates to the general convention to be held at Memphis the coming May.

This proved an interesting work and required quite a long time and numerous ballots. Following was the result: Clerical delegates—Rev. T. S. Wade, of Catlettsburg; Rev. J. M. Carter, of Charleston, W. Va.; Rev. B. F. Goaling, of this district; Rev. S. F. McClung, of the Prestonsburg district, and Rev. J. M. Lambert, of West Virginia.

Lay delegates—Joseph M. Furguson, of this district; Charles C. Brown, of Charleston, W. Va., and Levi N. Smith, of Parkersburg, W. Va., with Revs. T. N. Wilson and A. P. Borders as reserve delegates.

The fifth day's work consisted chiefly of the reporting of the various committees, all of which were found satisfactory and accepted.

The different editors of the journals devoted to the cause of this church were then voted a congratulatory and thankful message and all highly complimented on past efforts and results.

Following this came the acceptance of the letter of Rev. J. C. Thomas of the Free Methodist church, and he was ordained a minister of the M. E. Church South.

The first thing in the morning was the acceptance of the invitation of the church of Huntington to hold the next meeting one year hence at that place.
