Argue Over the Tariff Bill in the Mock Legislature's

SESSION OF LAST EVENING.

The Usual Democratic Straddle Was a Feature of the Proceedings—The Democrats Make a Faint-hearted Defense of the Free Trade and Revenue Tariffs Doctrines—The Republicans Had the Best of the Argument.

The meeting of the Republican mock legislature at the rooms of the Ohio County Republican club last evening was an immense success both in point of interest and attendance.

The object of the meeting was to discuss the question, "Will the Wilson tariff bill be of advantage to the interests and people of the United States?"

Mr. Cowden opened the debate by a formal statement of the question, and was followed by Mr. J. H. Burt (Rep.), who made a masterly address, principally devoted to the immense injury that will result from the free trade which is a feature of the Wilson bill.

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Mr. Dunlap (Dem.) next spoke well and to the point, calling this country the "land of the free and the home of the oppressed."

Captain Davidson (Rep.) made an excellent speech, devoted principally to the notary industry, as affected by the tariff bill, which has dealt it a severe blow, and by a man from a state who should be one of its foremost champions.

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Among those present, who were greatly interested in the novel legislative body, was ex-Governor Pierpont, of Fairmont, who is in the city on a visit.


