

A BRUTAL MURDER

Avenged by the Hanging of Courtney and Taylor.

THE STORY OF THE CRIME RETOLD.

Arthur Courtney and Henry Taylor hanged at Princess Anne, Maryland, for the Killing of Their Employer On a Vessel in Chesapeake Bay Last June—How the Crime Was Committed and the Murderers Detected—Captain Cooper Done to Death While Pleading For His Life.

PRINCESS ANNE, Md., Dec. 15.—The negroes Courtney and Taylor were hanged at 11:50 a. m.

The murder for which Arthur Courtney and Henry Taylor were hanged was committed on June 11 last. The murdered man was Captain Cooper, of a small vessel plying on the Chesapeake bay and the murderers were his crew. On the night of June 11, the three men retired as usual, but when the captain had fallen asleep Courtney and Taylor arose and one securing a sounding lead and the other a "black jack" struck the captain a stunning blow on the head and proceeded to rob him of his money and valuables. Their victim was not killed at first as they had thought, but revived and showed fight. The three men struggled up the hatchway to the deck. Captain Cooper was unarmed and quick as flash Taylor seized a quit and threw it over the head of the dazed man. The blows were continued and grabbing at the rigging to hold himself up the weakened man begged for life, calling on his assailants to save his life for the sake of his wife and children. The brutes paid no heed to the piteous appeal, and with a still more powerful blow Courtney struck Cooper, knocking him overboard. He then jumped into a yawl boat and struck the unfortunate man another blow before he sank beneath the waves.

After securing the keys to the captain's desk they got the money, amounting to over fifty-five dollars. Not in the least disturbed by the awful crime they had committed, and thinking to ward off suspicion, Courtney and Taylor went to Captain Cooper's home on the following Wednesday, and seeing his wife, told her that her husband had left the boat on Sunday and had not been seen since. On Thursday the murderers went to a store kept by Walter Duman, when a Mr. Blake came in and mentioned that Captain Cooper had been murdered. Hearing this the guilty wretches slipped out and were making off when Duman called to them. They returned and were locked up in an cyster house until Sunday. When they were taken to jail at Lancaster Court House, Va., a desperate but unsuccessful attempt was made to lynch the men.

Both negroes were of a cunning and ugly nature, and while imprisoned in the old stone jail at Princess Anne made two daring attempts to gain their liberty.

ESCAPED SIBERIA,

Only to Die by His Own Hand Among Strangers in Chicago.

CHICAGO, Dec. 15.—Sigmund Massakowski, a Russian refugee, committed suicide in the Lincoln park last night. John Woyesinski, a man claiming to be an agent for a society that extends aid to suffering Russians, told the coronor to-day that the suicide had been an officer in the czar's army, but being implicated in a political plot four months ago he had been forced to flee the country in disguise. He left a family in Russia, and fearing detection and being without funds he killed himself to escape the terrible fate which the agent said awaited him should he be captured.

INDIGNANT FARMERS.

They Condemn President Cleveland's Secretary of Agriculture.

CINCINNATI, O., Dec. 15.—Ohio state grange, Patrons of Husbandry, meeting at Sandusky, and the Indiana grange meeting at Seymour adopted caustic resolutions against Secretary J. Sterling Morton for his attack upon the granges. Indiana recommends withholding all reports until the secretary retracts.

LOS CORRELLOS, N. M., Dec. 15.—The miners of the White Ash Anthracite and Waldo mines, in mass meeting here, have resolved to make a demand upon the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe R. R. for November pay on the 23rd inst, and also prompt pay on the Saturday nearest the 17th of each month. The alternative is a strike.

A TERRIBLE WRECK.

Fifteen persons badly injured on the Pittsburgh, Virginia and Charleston Road.

PITTSBURGH, PA., Dec. 15.—The city bound accommodation train on the Pittsburgh, Virginia & Charleston R. R. was derailed at Balford station, thirty-five miles south of Pittsburgh at seven o'clock this morning and three coaches wrecked. No one was killed but fifteen persons were injured, a number seriously. Their names are:

- Conductor Young, badly cut about the head and two ribs broken, also injured internally; serious.
- J. H. Lannon, Brownsville, Pa., head cut and injured internally; serious.
- James A. Pryor, Belmont county, Ohio, shoulder mashed and injured internally; serious.
- A. V. Perviant, Manor, Pa., slightly injured.
- Mr. Thomas, Pittsburgh, head badly cut.
- Miss Lannon, Brownsville, slightly hurt.
- Patrick Gilmore, Lucyville, Pa., cut and bruised. His wife and child were seriously bruised.
- John Bailey, Brownsville, Pa., slightly cut about the head and face.
- Mrs. Theodore Watkins, Chaleroi, Pa., seriously cut about the head.

A number of others sustained slight bruises and cuts. The accident was caused by the grate bar of the locomotive falling on the tracks and derailing the locomotive. The train ran four hundred yards and was then overturned.

CAPTURED AT LAST.

The Author of Liceo Theatre Explosion in the Hands of the Police.

BARCELONA, Dec. 15.—The anarchist Joseph Codina, who was arrested and brought here from Perpignan, to which place he fled on the day following the Liceo theatre bomb outrage in the Liceo theatre, is now definitely stated to be the author of that disaster. In all, 143 anarchists are in prison here; a number of them will be transported on board the cruiser Navarra, the captain of which vessel has sealed orders regarding his destination.

Crown Point, Ind., Dec. 15.—It comes to light that Martin Costello will have to go to the Northern prison and remain there until the prize fight case is decided by the supreme court, which

will take at least three months. There is no chance for his keeping his freedom by giving bonds under the Indiana laws. The balance of the cases will rest until the supreme court's decision.

A BIG LOCK-OUT

Threatened Against the 6,000 River Miners—Another Conference to be Held.

PITTSBURGH, PA., Dec. 15.—The 6,000 coal miners employed in the Monongahela river pits will be locked out next week if they enforce the uniform mining rate of 2 1/2 cents adopted at yesterday's convention. The committee, appointed by the convention to confer with the operators, called at the coal exchange to-day.

The operators positively refused to confer with them, and as a result all work along the Monongahela and Youghiogheny rivers will likely cease next Tuesday.

Another convention has been called for next Monday. Returned to Work. PITTSBURGH, PA., Dec. 15.—The striking railroad coal miners at Finleyville, Gastonville & Snowdon returned to work to-day at the 60-cent rate and the mining troubles, on the Wheeling division of the Baltimore & Ohio railroad, are over.

Bomb Found in a Church. LONDON, Dec. 15.—A bomb charged with powder and shot and with a lighted match attached to it has been found in a church at Uelzen, Hanover.

MONSON'S TRIAL

Evidence That He Tried to Get Insurance On The Life of The Murdered Man.

EMERSON, Dec. 15.—Interest in the trial of Alfred J. Monson, the tutor charged with the murder of Lieut. Hambrough at Ardramont in August last, is developing as the case proceeds. Large crowds of people assembled about the court but only a few were able to obtain admittance.

The managers of the London, Liverpool and Globe Insurance companies at Glasgow and at Leeds testified that Monson endeavored to obtain a large insurance on the life of Lieut. Hambrough, but the insurance was refused because Monson was unable to prove an insurable interest in the young Lieut. The secretary of the Scottish Providence Insurance Company testified that Monson applied for 2,000 pounds insurance on Hambrough's life which was refused for the same reason as given by the London and Liverpool companies. A clerk in the employ of Kemp, Ford & Co., testified that in 1892 Monson was a bankrupt with assets of only 25 pounds against debts of 2,000 pounds.

WEST VIRGINIA SOLDIERS Who Were in the Late War—Medals Awaiting Them at Fairmont.

Fairmont Free Press. There are now in Fairmont about 8,000 medals in charge of Thomas A. Fleming and Henry M. Ruble, awaiting the claim of the proper owners. These medals were provided by the state of West Virginia. They are modeled after the usual style of the army badge, and bear the name of our state. On the edge of the medal is the name of the individual soldier. Very many of the names are spelled wrong, which makes the work of finding the owner difficult. It is well to state that every person who belonged to a West Virginia regiment or company in the late war, is entitled to one of these medals, and if not yet received by him, it is here awaiting the proper address. If the soldier be dead, then his widow, or his oldest son or daughter, or any of his children, or next of kin, can have it. There are now many West Virginia soldiers residing outside the state, and have been for years, whose addresses cannot be learned by the gentlemen in charge of the medals, and of course cannot deliver them.

All West Virginia soldiers who have not received their medal, should write at once to either Thomas A. Fleming, Fairmont, W. Va., or Henry M. Ruble,

Palatine, W. Va., who will immediately send you your medal with your name on the edge, and with no cost to the owner whatever. They are legacies left behind worth preserving.

PRINCESS COLONA.

Her Divorce Proceedings Suspended for Two Weeks.

PARIS, Dec. 15.—The first hearing of the suit for the legal separation brought by Princess Colona (the daughter of Mrs. John W. Mackay) against her husband took place yesterday before the sixth civil tribunal.

Maitre Desjardins, the prince's advocate, pleaded that the court had no jurisdiction on the ground that the prince was an Italian and that he resided his domicile at Naples, in spite of the fact that he habitually resided in Paris. The case was adjourned for a fortnight in order that the arguments for and against the jurisdiction of the court may be drawn up and passed upon.

GERMAN COMMERCIAL POLICY.

The Debate on the Treaties—Count Bismarck in Opposition to the Chancellor.

BERLIN, Dec. 15.—The debate on the third reading of the commercial treaties began to-day in the reichstag.

Count Herbert Bismarck attacked the policy of Chancellor Von Caprivi, saying that the chancellor's recent utterances gave the house the impression that he had become a free trader.

Continuing the count said that the farmers had been left in the lurch by the manufacturers regardless of the necessity which both were under to advance hand in hand.

According to Count Bismarck it is the small farmers who have suffered the most through the government's commercial policy.

One More Unfortunate. NICE, Dec. 15.—A Parisian stockbroker named Sorrieux, who had lost heavily at Monte Carlo, threw himself from a train near Villofranche railroad station yesterday and was killed. A companion of the unfortunate man was utterly unconcerned at his friend's death and insisted upon entering the very train from which his associate had just been killed and left a false address behind.

Another Spanish Outrage. MADRID, Dec. 15.—A bomb was exploded last evening at Verin on the premises of a merchant named Parade. The doors and windows of the residence were smashed, and the occupants of the house and the people in the vicinity were greatly frightened. The author of the outrage is not known.

Fourteen Killed. LONDON, Dec. 15.—A dispatch published here says that fourteen people have been killed and fifty wounded in a railroad collision near Sozovka, Russia.
