

AMERICA VS. ENGLAND.

In Cycle Racing We Can Knock Out the British Lion.

ZIMMERMAN'S GREAT VICTORY

Over Barden, the English Crack, at Paris Yesterday—Fifteen Thousand People Went Wild Over the American's Fine Sprinting—Sunday Base Ball and Other News of Sport.

PARIS, July 15.—Fifteen thousand people assembled to-day at the Buffalo Velodrome to witness the contests between Zimmerman, the American bicyclist, and Barden, the English rider. The first race, one mile, was easily won by Zimmerman, who finished a dozen lengths ahead of his competitor.

In the second race, five miles, Zimmerman followed Barden with the pace makers until the fifth lap was entered upon. Then he let himself go and shot ahead with such rapidity that Barden, seeing there was no possible chance for himself to win, retired.

BROKEN BY "PINKIE" BLISS.

The Chicago Man Juggles With Bicycle Records in Great Shape.

Boston, July 15.—Julian P. Bliss, of Chicago, succeeded in lowering the records for one mile, both standing and flying start, at Waltham yesterday afternoon. He also broke the records for two-thirds and three-quarters of a mile.

Berio and Cutter, two Boston riders, brought Bliss down to the start like a whirlwind. Bliss clung to the rear wheel of the tandem and seemed to be anchored there.
