Another Interesting Day's Session at Moundsville.

INTERESTING BRANCHES TREATED

By Able Instructors Yesterday—Talk on the Method of Grading Country Schools—The Singing is a Feature of the Institute—A Lecture Promised by the President of Marietta College.

After the usual devotional exercises yesterday morning the Marshall county teachers' institute began another interesting day. The institute this year is certainly blessed with beautiful singing.

The first lesson of the morning was percentage, by Instructor Powell. This is considered one of the most important parts of arithmetic and the teachers entered into the discussion of the subject with great earnestness. The next branch was grammar, taken up by Instructor Williams, which was followed by a short recess. H. A. Riggs, of Bannock, then spoke on the method of grading country schools. The morning session then adjourned after a general history lesson, the subject being the Medes and the Persians.

After dinner the teachers were again distressed by hearing the song called "The Owl and the Pussy Cat," revived by its admirers, the old maids.
Book-keeping was called. Professor Williams having charge of this branch. The lesson was on the forms of commercial papers.

County Superintendent Stivert then introduced Professor Deal, of the State Normal School, who talked in the interest of his institution. At the close of his talk a few minutes were spent in social conversation, followed by that beautiful song, "The West Virginia Hills." Orthography was taken up by E. Bonar. The consonants and sounds were defined. The day ended with history of West Virginia.

President J. Simpson, of Marietta college, will give a lecture and a series of stereopticon views to-morrow evening.

BELMONT COUNTY TEACHERS

In Annual Institute at St. Clairsville This Week.

The Belmont County Teachers' Institute opened at St. Clairsville Monday with eighty-one enrolled. The following corps of good instructors is present:

Dr. Draper, of the Illinois State University, instructor of higher branches; Prof. Kritzer, of Boston, music; Miss M. E. Coffin, of Detroit, kindergarten.
