Labor Moguls Meet and Congratulate Themselves.

MEETING OF THE TRADES ASSEMBLY

Yesterday afternoon a regular meeting of the Ohio Valley Trades and Labor Assembly was held at the assembly hall, which however, was only fairly well attended...

An appeal from the miners of Summit Mines, Pa., was received and on motion laid on the table.

The bakery question was again brought up by a delegate asserting that the local bakery should not be connected with the Pittsburgh man on whom the boycott was originally placed.

A motion to exclude the local bakery from the workings of the boycott was made but was met with numerous and excited objections.

Several other motions were made and the discussion got warmer and warmer. One motion was made that the arbitration committee should go to the bakery and see whether the management will allow the men employed there to be organized.

Others thought and a motion was made that the organization committee shall have the matter in charge.

A delegate asserted that any efforts to organize the employees of this bakery will be unsuccessful because someone, not the manager, will make the employees believe it is not for their interests to join the union.

The motion to refer to the arbitration committee was then put and resulted in its being carried 21 to 9.

This committee will at once go ahead and try to secure the consent of the baker to organize the men.

Delegate Michael Grogan moved that the assembly congratulate itself on the magnificent success scored in Saturday's big celebration. The motion was put and carried with a rush.

After the meeting of the assembly a farewell meeting of the labor day general committee was held for the purpose of winding up its affairs.

A good proportion of the membership of the committee was present. The amusements committee reported its programme had been carried to a finish without a hitch.

The president remarked the amusements were the best in the history of labor day celebrations.

The gate committee made a partial report on the number of people who attended the labor day celebration, and the number is 5,109.

Other committees made their reports, all of them were partial, however.

The secretary moved that the treasurer be authorized to hire a buggy and go the rounds to pay the bills.

The chairman of the various committees were appointed to close up labor day affairs to-day at 9 a. m.

The committee meets again next Saturday afternoon at 1 o'clock.
