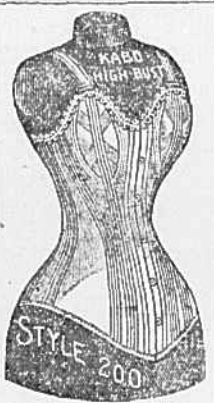

I. O. O. F. OUTING

At the Wheeling Park Takes Place This Afternoon.

THE GENERAL COMMITTEE MEETS

And Gives the Last Touches to the Arrangements That Are About Perfect—The Mozart Club Will Arrive From the East This Morning—Programme for the Two Performances. A Number of Out-of-Town Lodges Will be Here.

Oddly enough the Odd Fellows of Wheeling will own the town on an odd day of the month—the 27th. Such a condition of affairs is sure to bring the I. O. O. F. just what they want—a big crowd, balmy Indian summer weather and a consequent all around success. Last evening the general committee composed of representatives from the various city lodges of the order held a meeting at their hall on Chapline street and concluded arrangements for to-day's outing and entertainment at Wheeling park. Everything was found to be moving along smoothly, and the prediction was made that taking the advance sale of tickets into consideration there will be big audiences both at the matinee and evening performances of the famous Mozart Symphony Club, at the Wheeling Park Casino.

The first event on the day's programme is the street demonstration, which will take place at 10:30 o'clock. The various lodges that will participate include all of the local ones and those of Martin's Ferry, Bellairs, Bridgeport, Benwood, Moundsville and Clarington. It is expected that numerically speaking the parade will be one of the largest of the year in Wheeling. The lodges will form at 9:30 at the Odd Fellows' hall, corner of Chapline and Twelfth streets, and will move promptly at the hour named, under command of Chief Marshal Godfrey Schul, assisted by a numerous and brilliant staff, over the following route:

Chapline to Twelfth, on Twelfth to Market, on Market to Teath, on Teath to Main, on Main to Twenty-fourth, on Twenty-fourth to Chapline, on Chapline to Twentieth, on Twentieth to Market, on Market to Sixteenth, and out Sixteenth to the motor office, where they will take the 12 o'clock motor for the park.

Last evening Chief McNichol, of the city police department, detailed the following officers to head the Odd Fellows' parade: Lieut. Lukins and Officers Harberfeld, Porter, Daum, Donavin, Minkemeyer, O'Brien. Before 12 o'clock the parade will have been concluded and the paraders and their friends, together with the public generally, that will take in the entertainment, will leave for the Wheeling park on special Elm Grove motor trains.

The programme to be given at the afternoon performance is a very fine one and an equally good one will be presented at the evening performance. The afternoon programme is as follows:

Immediately after the matinee performance the Odd Fellows have made arrangements for several special motor trains, that will be in readiness at the park to bring back to town all who attend the performance, who desire to return. In addition to the musical attractions at the casino, a number of additional attractions have been provided at the park, which will no doubt be liberally patronized.

The Mozart club is expected to arrive at an early hour this morning from the east.

The afternoon performance will be started immediately on the arrival of the 2 o'clock motor train and the evening performance on the arrival of the 8 o'clock motor.

SAD ATTEMPT AT SUICIDE.

A Well Known and Beloved Young Lady Tries to Take her own Life.

The town of Piedmont, Belmont county, Ohio, and surrounding community were thrown into a state of intense excitement Friday, by the news of an attempt at suicide by Miss Etta Cash, a handsome and accomplished young lady about thirty-five years of age, belonging to one of the most prominent families of Belmont county. The story as told to a reporter of the INTELLIGENCER is that on Tuesday night a week ago, Miss Cash, after retiring, got up and dressed and slipped out of the house unnoticed. On the following morning her clothes were found in her room by her sister, who noticed they were soaked with mud and water, and on being questioned Miss Cash told the family that she had attempted suicide by drowning in Stillwater creek. She added that she had committed a terrible crime and must die. A watch was kept over her by the family, who were surprised at her strange hallucination.

Friday morning her father went to her door and told her to get up and walk around, as it was such a bright, cheerful morning it would make her feel better. She made no reply, and the father went away to his work on the farm. Not long afterwards her sister, Ada, went to her room, and on entering was shocked to see her sister lying in bed with a terrible gash across her throat and bleeding profusely. An alarm was sounded and medical aid summoned. It was found that no arteries nor her windpipe had been severed and that there was a very slight hope of her life. Her wound was carefully dressed, but she made violent attempts to tear the bandages off, saying that she must and would die. A sharp razor was found in her bed, with which she had made the cut. No possible reason can be assigned for the rash act. She was a member of the M. E. church and a devoted Christian, was respected and loved by all who knew her, and her strange action has caused much sorrow. All are puzzled and entirely unable to assign any cause except mental aberration. When last heard from she was lying in a very critical condition, with but slight hopes of recovery.

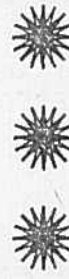
