TRAVEL on the street railway on the Ohio side was very heavy yesterday.

A MEETING of the council committee on claims has been called for this evening.

THERE was only one plain drunk in the police court Saturday morning, and no cases in the evening.

SATURDAY the eight-inch water main in Alley C and on Tenth and Chapline streets was tested with the high pressure and burst in two places.

JOSEPHINE BOYD's Tenth street house was raided again last night by Officers Herbert, West and Watson, and the landlady and three girls arrested.

THE Knights of Pythias committee of Bridgeport, held a meeting yesterday and arranged matters and invitations for their entertainment to be held in the opera house on next Thursday evening.

SATURDAY night "A Trip to Chautau-town" was given at the Opera House to a large and delighted audience. The specialties have been improved in some respects, but the singing is scarcely up to that of last season.

JOHN NOLAN alias John Bull and Harry Rice, both of Wheeling, were arrested in Kirkwood on a charge of drunk and disorderly. They were locked up for a hearing this morning before Mayor Williams, of Bridgeport.

ROBERT MANTELL will be the next attraction at the Opera House. He will present his very successful romantic drama, "Monbars," with new scenery and accessories, next Saturday night, and the house will no doubt be packed.

Mrs. LIZZIE DOWNER died Saturday of apoplexy. Deceased was sixty years of age, and was widely known and esteemed for her many admirable traits of character. The funeral will take place this afternoon, from her late residence, No. 2303 Main street.

THE residence of Mr. O. P. Porter, on East Fifteenth street, was entered by thieves Saturday night in the absence of the family, and some diamonds and jewelry and a watch stolen. There is no clue to the thief, but he was evidently somewhat familiar with the house.

A NUMBER of young ladies of the South Side met recently and organized what is known as the Sweet Violet Club. The officers were duly elected. The object of the club is of a social nature. Weekly meetings will be held at the homes of the various members alternately, and a hop will be given once a month.
