MACHINERY AND LABOR. Has the Work of Invention Been of Real Detriment to Labor? The Rock River Conference Report Answered.

David Sinton, upon his return from the Centennial Exposition at Philadelphia, in 1876, was heard to remark that there was too much machinery in this country. Viewed from a certain standpoint this was true, but from an enlarged standpoint it is not true.

Electricity on our street railroads has taken the place of horse power. The telephone has taken the place of messenger boys. The type-setting machine has taken the place of compositors, and so on through the whole range of mechanical improvements.

At this juncture of industrial affairs there was brought in at a meeting of the Rock River conference of the Methodist Episcopal church a report embodying the following proposition: "Labor has been pushed from its former field by machinery and steam, electricity, and inventions that can do everything but think. Capital combines to do by machinery and monopoly, at lowest price, all the work, and the laborers stand idle in the market-places."

pare this with 1857, when there were no street railroads in Cincinnati; when there were a few omnibus lines, and when the people walked chiefly between their places of business and their homes. These modern improvements increased employment for armies of people, while at the same time they have increased the cost of living, and to a large extent the comforts of the people.

The Rock River report takes the ground that machinery has driven labor out of employment, and that laborers are standing idle in our streets as a consequence. Up to 1892 laborers were not seeking in vain for employment. They were not working for inadequate wages. They were all employed, and as compared with other countries, were profitably employed.
