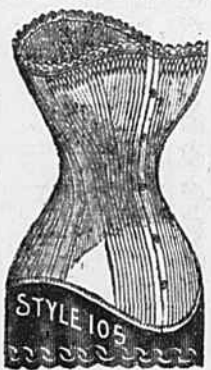

PHYSICIANS MEET.

A Memorial Meeting to Respect to the Late Dr. Cummins

IS CALLED FOR THIS AFTERNOON

All of the Physicians of the Vicinity Are Cordially Invited—A Committee on Resolutions Appointed. Talks With Physicians Regarding Prevalent Diseases and the New Diphtheria Cure.

Last evening the Ohio county Medical Society held a meeting at their quarters in the board of education's rooms, on Market street, for the purpose of taking action relative to the death of the late Dr. R. H. Cummins, a valued member of the organization, and one of Wheeling's best known and well liked physicians. There was a good attendance of the members, the president, Dr. H. B. Baguley presiding, and Dr. Hildreth acted as secretary.

After informal discussion the society decided to call a memorial meeting of the physician of Wheeling, Ohio county and vicinity, to be held at the rooms of the board of education in the Huo building this afternoon at 4 o'clock, when suitable resolutions touching the loss by death of Dr. Cummins will be acted upon. A committee on resolutions composed of Drs. L. D. Wilson, F. J. LeMoynes Hupp and E. A. Hildreth was appointed and the members will draw up resolutions that will be presented at this afternoon's meeting. The society cordially invites all physicians of the vicinity, whether members of the society or not, to attend this meeting, to pay their tribute of respect to the dead physician.

The society then went into regular session and transacted some routine business. Papers on technical subjects were read and discussion followed.

An INTELLIGENCER man talked with a number of physicians last night relative to the general health of the city, with special reference to the situation here regarding the dread diphtheria and scarlet fever. Dr. R. W. Hazlett, when asked as to the merits of the new Koch anti-toxine, which is claimed by some to be a specific for diphtheria, replied that he had not been able to form an opinion, as it had not been introduced into this section. He expected, however, to find that it would not effect cures in every case where it is used.

Dr. John L. Dickey, Dr. Etzler and one or two other physicians who were approached relative to the prevalence of diphtheria just now, united in saying that at present the disease is on the decline and that in their opinion this community has seen the worst.

Dr. E. A. Hildreth was of the opinion that the city health department should have a good big appropriation, when systematic work in riving the city a good cleaning up could be pursued. He considered the filth the cause of a large proportion of the sickness this winter.
