FOSTER'S MISSION

Is Misunderstood by a Leading English Newspaper. NOT A CLEVELAND APPOINTMENT. But Goes to Japan as a Private Individual on Invitation of China to Help Her Plenipotentiaries in Their Negotiations For Peace—Mr. Foster Will Leave at Once.

LONDON, Dec. 28.—The Westminster Gazette this afternoon says: "It is generally believed that America took more than a kindly concern in the affairs of Korea. The envoy of the United States was once high in Korean favor. Then China was jealous, and that China now seeks the aid of the United States is one of those curious transformations of these times of whirling."

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 28.—The comment of the Westminster Gazette refers to the announcement made by the Associated Press last night that Mr. John W. Foster, formerly secretary of state, has been requested by the Chinese government to go to Japan and meet the plenipotentiaries of the former government in order to aid them in the negotiations for peace.

But as intimated by the Associated Press, Japan may not consent to receive the second Chinese peace commissioner, Shao Yao Lien, on account of the fact that when Governor of Formosa he offered rewards for Japanese heads.

STOLE NEARLY A MILLION. Enormous Amount Obtained by Forgery by Augustus Lippert. LONDON, Dec. 28.—At the office of the agent general in London of Cape Colony, Sir Charles Mills, a representative of the Associated Press was informed today that there was no doubt as to the identity of Wilhelm Augustus Lippert, who was recently arrested in Cincinnati, Ohio, and brought to New York preliminary to his extradition to England, on the charge of obtaining \$843,675 by forgery.

SHORTAGE GROWING. Cashier Bielby and Teller Gillette Stole About \$70,000. ROSK, N. Y., Dec. 28.—The total shortage of Cashier Bielby and Teller Gillette of the Central National Bank, increases as the experts continue their investigation of the books. It has now reached an aggregate of \$70,000.

Historic Mansion to Be Destroyed. WASHINGTON, Dec. 28.—An opera house is to be erected upon the site of the Blaine residence on Lafayette Square in which the statesman died, a permit for the building having been issued by the district commissioners today.

The new building will be constructed so as to allow a roof garden, the first of the kind in Washington. The Blaine house was the old Seward mansion.

TREND OF TRADE. R. G. Dun & Co.'s Report—Conditions at the Close of the Year. NEW YORK, Dec. 28.—R. G. Dun & Co.'s weekly review of trade will say: Commercial failures in 1894 already reported number 14,292 against 15,242 last year, with liabilities of \$163,238,404 against \$346,779,889 last year.

The stock market today was less active than on yesterday, the sales aggregating less than \$10,000,000. The market closed at 2 1/2 per cent. Prime mercantile paper 2 1/4 per cent. Sterling exchange quiet but firm, with actual business in bankers' bills at 85 1/2 per cent. for demand. Silver certificates 99 1/2 per cent. The total sales of stocks to-day were \$1,698,828.

Wheat has declined one-half a cent, though western receipts have been only 7,112,098 bushels. Sales of wool this month have been 17,896,800 pounds against 13,049,197 last year and 21,302,300 in 1892, and Ohio XX has sold at 17 cents.

Creedon Wants to Resign. NEW YORK, Dec. 28.—Police Captain Timothy I. Creedon, who testified before the Lexow committee that he had paid \$15,000 for his promotion, filed his application to-day for retirement from the force. The commissioners will consider the application this afternoon.

Brooklyn, Dec. 27.—Deputy County Treasurer Harrigan said to-day regarding the story that the county treasurer's accounts show a shortage of \$89,649 that he has the word of the expert who made the examination for the board of supervisors for the statement that there is no actual deficit.
