In the St. Louis Convention. The Pittsburgh Dispatch sent out inquiries asking of each state the Republican preference and the feeling towards Senator Quay for the presidential nomination.

The Dispatch makes up from the replies the following table to show the first ballot: McKinley 235, Quay 215, Allison 76, Morton 60, Davis 57, Cullom 28, Bradley 18, Scattering 15.

The votes necessary to a choice being 459, McKinley lacks 124, Reed 244. It is too early to know how the first ballot will stand, but McKinley is likely to be stronger on the first ballot than the Dispatch figures allow.

For example, West Virginia is put down as 10 for McKinley and 2 for Reed. Mr. Reed is about as likely to get 6 from West Virginia as two. We think McKinley will get the solid delegation of 12.

He will if the delegates represent the constituencies back of them, and there is no reason to doubt that they will. The Republicans of West Virginia are for McKinley and expect to be represented by delegates who will give him loyal support.

The Quay strength on the first ballot is put at 76 votes. This is but 12 more than the vote of Mr. Quay's own state and does not show a formidable candidacy at the start.

The canvass made strengthens the conclusion heretofore reached that at the opening of the struggle it will be McKinley against the field. The Ohio candidate will have a pronounced lead over any one of his rivals on the first roll-call.

The tactics of the opposition will be rather to tire McKinley's supporters out than to endeavor to concentrate upon anyone else early in the proceedings, a movement which would be fraught with considerable danger.

The tactics of the opposition may be understood to mean Senator Quay's tactics. The Dispatch being Senator Quay's organ, McKinley's supporters are to be “tired out” before any attempt is made to combine the field against the Ohio man.

This prediction is the more reasonable because a large part of the Quay strength and of the Morton strength will be held away from McKinley at the start only by the “favorite son” device.

Speaking of tiring out McKinley's supporters and combining the opposition, why is this effort to be made? Isn't McKinley a good man and a representative Republican? Nobody doubts that if nominated he will make a good President.

What is to be gained to the party or the country by a successful combination against him? The reasons must be of a character that will never be admitted to a Republican national convention.

The men who will try the tiring out and combining process have tried the same before and failed. They are not more powerful now than they were then.

The harmony and solidity of the Republican party in West Virginia have absolutely nothing to do with the matter. He is as friendly to Mr. Atkinson as he is to any man in the state, and he has no better friend than Mr. Atkinson is.

It is not true that Senator Elkins has made a demand on Mr. Atkinson for any of the patronage at the governor's command and is now resentfully encouraging a movement against Mr. Atkinson because he would not agree to deliver.

The Register says that the cases of Mr. Elkins as a candidate for the senate and of Mr. Atkinson as a candidate for governor are “exactly parallel” so far as the Intelligencer is concerned.
