

THE NEXT SENATOR.

Hancock County Conferees Are Solidly for Mr. Robertson.

HE WILL GET THE NOMINATION

Without Opposition, Probably—Resolutions Passed by Hancock's Representatives Make the Matter Certain—Ohio County Republican Club's "Mock Congress" To-night—Other News in the Political Arena.

There has been a degree of uncertainty relative to the position of the Hancock county senatorial conferees in the matter of the nomination for state senator in the First senatorial district, which includes Hancock, Brooke and Ohio counties. Now, however, whatever uncertainty there was has been dispelled. The ten senatorial conferees recently chosen by Hancock county Republicans were said to be divided between Prosecuting Attorney A. W. Robertson and Mr. Frank M. Smith, the latter at present Hancock's representative in the house of delegates. The following resolution recently passed by the conferees shows that they are unanimously for Mr. Robertson for the nomination. As the nomination is due to go to Hancock this week, it is reasonably certain that he is the man who will be put up by the conferees of the entire district. The resolution:

Whereas, in accordance with a custom which has prevailed for some years in the First senatorial district, Hancock county is entitled to the nominee for state senator; therefore, Resolved, That we, the senatorial conferees of Hancock county, unanimously present the name of A. W. Robertson as our choice for state senator from the county which we have the honor to represent.

All the chances favor the Republican senatorial candidate. In 1892 Mr. H. C. Hervey, of Brooke, was defeated by Senator Farr, of Brooke, by a small plurality, but in 1894, Senator Whitaker carried the district for the Republicans by a rousing majority. With Ohio county in the Republican column as strongly as it is now conceded to be, the district is reliably Republican.

THE "MOCK CONGRESS."

The First Session Is to Be Held This Evening—The Debaters.

VOTE CANVASSED.

County Committee Corrects the Vote of Last Saturday's Election.

The Republican county committee met last evening and canvassed the returns of the late primaries. The only material change that resulted from the canvass was the decision of the committee awarding the nomination for one of the justices of the peace in Triadelphia district to W. C. Smith, instead of M. F. Smith, who appeared to be elected on the face of the returns. The mistake occurred in misprinting the initials of W. C. Smith, which appeared on the ballot as "N. C." Thirty-four voters who knew that these were not his initials scratched them out and wrote "W. C." The committee decided that the intentions of the voters were too plain to be disregarded, and they accordingly counted them, which gave W. C. Smith received 182 votes. The two candidates for justice of the peace for Triadelphia district therefore are W. C. Smith and J. C. Maxwell.

With the returns from Potomac in the West Liberty district delegation, to the state convention is as follows: Abraham McColloch, Elsa Foreman, W. B. Gibson, N. E. Myers and W. H. C. Curtis. A correction was made in the total vote cast on the Island for Alfred Beymer for constable. The mistake was in receiving the returns by telephone, the figures being put down 31. The corrected returns show that Mr. Beymer received 231 votes. The correction, however, does not change the result. A few other immaterial changes were made correcting mistakes in addition, but the general result as announced was in no way affected. There were no protests made to the committee, and the best of feeling prevails.

The company is headed by the clever Lizzie Gonzalez and she is supported by a company of carefully selected operatic stars, including Donnelly, Webb, Pullman, Mattie Reeves and others, of great prominence. It is the first time comic opera has ever been attempted in Wheeling for a run of two weeks and Manager Feinler is to be commended for his pluck and enterprise. The usual matinee will be given during the engagement.

In speaking of the attraction which comes to the Grand the last three nights of this week, the New York Sun says: The Grand was packed last evening with an enthusiastic audience, people being turned away. The play was Tony Farrell's presentation of Murphy O'Shea's comedy drama, "Garry Owen." The

THAT "CLUB AMENDMENT"

To the License Ordinance to be Brought Up in Council Again.

A very important amendment to the license ordinance was killed in the First branch of council at its meeting Tuesday night, either through misapprehension or lack of appreciation of its worthiness. It was the amendment offered to the annual license ordinance by Mr. Alex Campbell in the second branch, that all clubs handling donated beer or liquors be compelled to take out a coffee house license. This passed the Second branch by a vote of 12 to 8. In the First branch its passage was blocked by Mr. Peter Farrell objecting to it on the ground that it required a majority of two-thirds, which the friends of the measure claim is not correct.

People who have seen the evils growing out of the various clubs where free drinks are dispensed, to say nothing of the injustice it works to regular saloonkeepers who pay a big license, will wonder that such a fair and commendable measure should fail in passing. The friends of the measure, however, are not disheartened, but will pass the amendment to a passage at the next meeting of council.

STATE FAIR GROUNDS.

The Property in Fine Condition—Many Horses Training There.

The state fair grounds are in excellent condition now, the trees are out, and the grass is up and the track was never in better shape for driving or training. In the evenings many teams owned in the city are driven over the race course.

Hoge and Estep, of St. Clairsville, have stables of runners on the ground in training, among the horses being the famous Pilgrim and Irish H. Besides these stables there are ten trotters and pacers on the premises being put through their working daily in preparations for the approaching racing season.

Last night the speed committee of the association, consisting of Messrs. G. Ed. Mendel, A. M. Hamilton, P. O. Reymann and assistant superintendent Robert Anderson, held a meeting and roughly blocked out the speed events for the fair next fall. They will go to Pittsburgh Friday to meet with the managers of the Allegheny circuit to arrange matters so that there will be no conflicting dates.
