REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION.

Pursuant to the instructions of the state Republican central committee, and the call of the national Republican committee, a state convention of delegates representatives of the Republican party of West Virginia will be held at the city of Clarksburg, in the county of Harrison, on Thursday, the 14th day of May, 1896, at 11 o'clock noon, for the purpose of electing delegates-at-large and four alternate-at-large to represent this state in the national Republican convention, to be held in the city of St. Louis, Missouri, on the 18th day of June, 1896.

It is recommended that the basis of representation in said state convention be one vote for each 100 voters and fraction thereof greater than fifty, cast for President Benjamin Harrison in 1892. It is recommended that each county choose as many delegates to said convention as will equal the number of votes it will be entitled to cast therein; and that the chairman of each Republican county committee call a convention in his county, or other proper meeting, to choose delegates to the state convention; in which county conventions or meetings the cooperation of all persons in favor of the purpose hereafter set forth by the Republican party in its efforts to promote protection to American workmen, American agriculture and American industry; a system of reciprocity, good government in the state and nation, and a return of prosperity.

First District Republican Convention.

The Saturday Half Holiday Meets with Approval

IN THE WHOLESALE DISTRICT.

Over Thirty Signatures were Obtained Yesterday to the Petition to the Freight Agents' Association that the Freight Stations Close at 1 p. m. During the Three Summer Months—The Petition will be Circulated To-day.

As mentioned in the Intelligencer yesterday morning there is a movement on foot looking to the suspension of business in the wholesale district on Saturday afternoon during the three hot months, June, July and August. The petition to the freight agents' association, asking that the freight stations be closed for the receipt of freight on Saturday afternoon, was circulated on Main street yesterday afternoon. With one or two exceptions every business firm approached gladly signed the petition and agreement. It is now seen that the anticipated opposition of some strength to the half holiday movement will not materialize. The committee will circulate the petition again to-day, a number of firms having not been seen yesterday. It is also proposed that the banks shall be included in the closing at 1 p. m., and the bankers will be asked to co-operate with the wholesalers to-day, if possible, too, the offices of manufacturing establishments will be included.

The petition and agreement and the signatures obtained yesterday, follow: "We, wholesale merchants, bankers and manufacturers, hereby petition the railroad companies doing business in Wheeling, through the Freight Agents' Association, that they close the freight stations for the receipt of freight, every Saturday during the months of June, July and August, at 1 o'clock, p. m."

"We, wholesale merchants, bankers and manufacturers, do hereby agree to close our places of business at 1 p. m. every Saturday, during the months of June, July and August. Providing there is not a sufficient response to this agreement to make it practicable, we agree to attend a meeting of the chamber of commerce to pass a resolution requesting the Freight Agents' Association to close the freight stations at the hour of 1 p. m. on Saturdays, during June, July and August. When the railroads take this action it will force a suspension of business on Saturday afternoon. (Signed.)"
