JUDGE CAMPBELL

Concedes that Captain Dovener has a Majority of the

DELEGATES TO THE CONVENTION

OF FIRST DISTRICT REPUBLICANS—AN AUTHORIZED INTERVIEW IN WHICH HE PROMISES THE NOMINEE OF THE WHEELING CONVENTION HIS CORDIAL SUPPORT—ARRANGEMENTS BEING MADE FOR TO-MORROW'S GATHERING.

The contest for the Republican nomination for Congress, between Judge John A. Campbell and Representative B. B. Dovener has been virtually settled by the concession of Judge Campbell that Captain Dovener has secured a majority of the convention, which will assemble at the Park Casino to-morrow to name the candidate. Yesterday Judge Campbell authorized the following statement in an interview with an Intelligencer reporter:

"It is due to the strong and earnest Republican support I have had throughout the district," said Judge Campbell, "as well as the delegates selected in my behalf, to make a statement. Only in one instance have I spoken for publication, and only then when I deemed the necessities of the case demanded it. I deem it proper to say frankly to my Republican friends and supporters that the result of the district conventions held in Harrison and Glimmer counties, respectively, on Thursday and Saturday last, seem to give assurance that Captain Dovener will have the requisite number of votes in the convention to receive the nomination.

"Two weeks ago last Sunday Mr. Dovener gave out a statement that at that time he had 138 votes, or twelve more than would secure a nomination. This statement was unsupported by the facts at that time. Outside of his own county, giving him the benefit of all the votes he could marshal, including six votes of Braxton, properly belonging to me, he had between thirty and thirty-five votes, which, added to the sixty-seven of Ohio county votes he claimed, would give him scarcely a hundred.

"This claim of 138 votes, published and circulated over this district, I found on entering Glimmer late Thursday, was accepted as authoritative by our friends, and nothing was being done. Mr. Dovener carried Glimmer, and the one delegate elected at large to support me I concede to him. I cheerfully release Mr. Hoyt from all obligations to support me, and request that his vote be cast for Mr. Dovener.

"I NEED SCARCELY ADD," CONCLUDED JUDGE CAMPBELL, "THAT IN CONCERNING MR. DOVENER A MAJORITY OF THE DELEGATES ELECTED, IF HE IS NOMINATED ON THURSDAY IT WILL BE MY DUTY AS WELL AS MY PLEASURE, TO GIVE HIM MY CORDIAL AND EARNEST SUPPORT, AND I TRUST THAT ALL MY FRIENDS WILL DO LIKEWISE."

Judge Campbell appears to have borne the work of his campaign well, and was in a cheerful mood while discussing the matter yesterday. He declared that he made his statement because he thought it due to those who had given him cordial support for the nomination, and in justice to himself. He will, he said, as in the past be found in line for Republicanism and in support of the nominee, a statement which all who know him regard as needless, in view of his long and earnest devotion to the Republican cause.

CONVENTION ARRANGEMENTS. Chairman James K. Hall, of the local committee in charge of arrangements for the congressional convention to-morrow, announces that all preparations have been made for the gathering, which will be called to order at 11:30 o'clock in the commodious Casino at Wheeling Park. The delegates will leave the city for the park on a special motor on the Wheeling & Elm Grove road, leaving the Sixteenth street station immediately after the departure of the regular 11 o'clock train.

Delegates are requested to call at the mayor's office, in the city building, before 11 o'clock. There they will obtain badges and tickets for the trip to the park.

The Opera House band has been engaged by the local committee to furnish music for the convention.
