One serious accident knocked Arthur Gardiner out of the final of the great American \$1,000 handleap, and nearty placed plucky Bill Martin hors du combat. This happened at the close of the second heat of the contest, Martin being at the front of the bunch and apparently a winner, when he elipped over the pole and side long the track. Gardiner went, over him, Eds. Stevens followed and then Lou Coburn went down in the sickening heap. Cooper and McFarland were in the finish, but escaped buckly from a spiki. From sixry yards he gained fourth, leading the back bunch over the tape.

Martin was the hero of the meet, for he came out to ride as badly a cut up and scarred man as has been seen on the track this year.
