The concert begins on the arrival of the 7:30 o'clock special motor. Dancing in the casino will follow the concert.

"AMERICAN BOY"

Battleship Movement will have a Celebration on Friday.

RANKIN GOOD THE AUTHOR

OF THE IDEA, IS TO BE HERE THEN—HE WILL BE MET AT THE RAILROAD STATION BY SEVERAL HUNDRED SCHOOL BOYS, AND WILL ADDRESS THE WHEELING BOYS—SPEAKING, CONCERT AND DANCING AT WHEELING PARK.

Never before has there been and possibly not again in many years will there be such a gathering of school boys as that called for this evening in one of the council chambers at the city building. The meeting is called by Elmer Bonnette and Harry Weisgerber, thirteen year old school boys, of the Union district public school, for the purpose of arranging for next Friday's demonstration, when it is expected Wheeling's school boys will raise several hundred dollars for the "American Boy" battleship fund, the particulars of which were first given in the Intelligencer some time ago, just after the idea was sprung by young Rankin Good, a Woodward high school boy, of Cincinnati. On Friday, the management of the Wheeling & Elm Grove railroad has agreed to give a goodly percentage of its receipts to the "American Boy" fund, and the boys propose to do all they can to encourage a record-breaking day of traffic on the suburban line. At to-night's meeting many of the details of "American Boy" day will be arranged. Master Bonnette, who has taken the foremost part in the movement here, will preside at the meeting, and no doubt his assistant, Master Weisgerber, will be at the secretary's desk. Mayor Butts and City Clerk Watkins would do well to attend the meeting and get some pointers from the youngsters.

Master Bonnette submitted to an interview at the hands of an Intelligencer reporter last night, and outlined his plans with a clearness and entire grasp of his subject that would have done Chauncey Depew himself credit.

He proposes to arrange for a big school boy parade on Friday afternoon. The parade, to be made up of all the school boys of the city who will participate, will form shortly before 3 o'clock on Eighteenth street, and the line of march will be to the Baltimore & Ohio passenger station, South Side, where there will be a tremendous ovation upon the arrival of Rankin Good, the Cincinnati boy, who is responsible for the "American Boy" idea, on the 3:25 train. Young Good will be given the post of honor at the head of the procession, and then the line of march will be taken up town, as follows: From the station to Market, up Market to Twelfth, on Twelfth to Chapline, on Chapline to Fifteenth, on Fifteenth to McCulloch, on McCulloch to Sixteenth, on Sixteenth to Eoff, and on Eoff to the Terminal station grounds, where there is to be an open air meeting, at which an address by Rankin Good will be the principal feature.

The programme further contemplates extensive "doings" in the evening at beautiful Wheeling park. The boys are expected to congregate there at 8 p. m., accompanied, where desirable, by their parents and friends. At 8 o'clock, in the Casino, there will be another address by Master Good, and this will be followed by dancing and music. The dancing music will be donated by Prof. Jones. Mr. William Clemans will have one or two vocal selections, and the Waldo Mandolin Club will play. The Mountain State Quartette will also have a place on the programme, and altogether an excellent programme will be had. In the afternoon the Cathedral School Cadets will appear in a body.
