Sound Money's Triumphs.

One of the most notable features of the present political campaign is the apparent abandonment of the free silver issue by the agitators on that side of the question in the Democratic party.

More marked still is this evidence in the great sound money states of the country where Democratic conventions have been held, the most notable instance being that of Connecticut.

"The Democracy of Connecticut is now, as it has ever been, in favor of bimetalism, as it does, the most stable standard of value, and we declare ourselves unalterably opposed to monometallism of any kind."

Jefferson's bimetalism was opposed to the free coinage of silver as it is advocated to-day. It was opposed to silver monometallism, and that is what the Connecticut Democratic convention has declared against.

Connecticut is not the only state in which the Democrats have shown this evidence of the tired feeling with which Bryanism has affected them.

In New York, the most influential papers of the Democratic faith are warning the party that no Democrat can be elected on a platform aimed at the financial honor of the country.

The Intelligencer does not hold that the silver question has witnessed its last day, but that the signs of the times are significant as tending to that end.

and other national issues, and their desperate efforts to substitute matters which are not party issues and to resort to personal assaults on Republican and Republican administrations.

An Evasive Organ.

The Intelligencer of Friday, in calling attention to a point made concerning Judge Johnston's gold record, by Mr. Edwards in a joint debate in the Third district, where the latter is the Republican candidate and the former the Democratic nominee, incidentally referred to a report that Col. Bryan desired to be relieved of his military duties, and suggested that he be sent for to help the Third District Democrats out of their embarrassing situation.

This point, which was the sole purpose of the article, the Register ignored in a lengthy editorial comment, in which it made the incidental reference to Colonel Bryan the text of a tirade of abuse of the Intelligencer, and sought to show that it had misrepresented Mr. Bryan.

In the meantime, to sum it up, Judge Johnston stands without a defense from his party organ, while an immaterial sentence in the Intelligencer, referring to an alleged interview with a man who is a candidate for no office this year on the Democratic ticket, was conceived by the Register to be of more importance than the paramount point that the Democratic candidate for Congress in a West Virginia district is running on a platform inconsistent with his record.

Mr. Brady's Nomination.

In choosing Mr. J. C. Brady as the Republican nominee for the state senate, to succeed Hon. N. E. Whitaker, the First district conferees selected a man who stands high as a citizen in whom the public has confidence, but one whose legislative experience and strict integrity, together with his personal popularity, insures that the people will be creditably and faithfully represented in the upper house of the legislature—

General regret has been expressed that Senator Whitaker found it necessary, owing to his obligations to his business interests, to decline a renomination, which would have been unanimously tendered him, but the way was open to choose a good man in his stead, and the conference lost no time about it.

Must be No Delay.

The whole country will applaud the President for his emphatic course with reference to the evacuation of Cuba by the Spanish army. Blanco and the Spanish government are making an effort to delay matters, and the Spanish commissioners have represented to the representatives of this government at Havana that it will be impossible to complete the evacuation until the last of February.

A great deal of indulgence has already been shown by the United States, and the President does not intend that the limit of patience shall be exhausted.

Speculations regarding the specific instructions to our peace commission should be taken only as speculations, for no one knows what the instructions are, or how far the commission will be obliged to exercise its own discretion.

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GOLD DEMOCRATS

They will not Vote for Any Free Silver Democrats—Selling Under False Colors. Special Dispatch to the Intelligencer.

MORGANTOWN, W. Va., Sept. 25.—What part the Gold Democratic organization in the state is going to take in the congressional campaign is a matter of considerable speculation by both Republicans and Silver Democrats.

Your correspondent has it from two of the best known members of the state organization that it will take no part as an organization and that as far as this state is concerned the organization is abandoned.

When asked how its members would vote in the November elections both of these men expressed the belief that they would vote with the Republicans.

A glance at the records of the congressional candidates shows that at least two of them are at heart in favor of the gold standard.

These two are John T. McGraw, who is opposing Congressman Dayton in this district, and Judge Johnson, who is opposing William Seymour Edwards in the Third, and it is no secret among the leaders of the silver wing that they were given the nominations on a silver platform in the hope that their personalities would draw the strength of the Gold Democrats.

This they will not do. Out of twenty-five in the Second district interviewed by your correspondent only one expressed his intention of voting for the Democratic nominee, and the influential ones, who are conversant with the situation declare that this may be taken as an indication of the feeling throughout the state.

Senatorial Convention Called.
