WOMEN IN MILLS.

Discussed at Yesterday's Meeting of Trades Assembly.

PETITION TO THE LEGISLATURE

PRESENTED, ASKING THAT THEY BE EXCLUDED—THE ASSEMBLY, HOWEVER, DOES NOT FAVOR SO RADICAL A MEASURE, AND PREFERS TO CHAMPION EQUAL WAGES FOR MAN OR WOMAN PERFORMING THE SAME WORK.

Yesterday afternoon a regular meeting of the Ohio Valley Trades & Labor Assembly was held at Trades Assembly hall on Market street, President Riley in the chair and Secretary Sallisbury at the desk. There was a fair attendance of delegates.

The labor day general committee reported progress toward a full statement of the late celebration.

The following new delegates were admitted and obligated: Journeymen Tailors of America, No. 248—Edward Shea, Carl Pell and Stephen Divorakl.

Wheeling Typographical Union No. 79 reported that A. Carenbauer had been named a delegate to the assembly in place of A. D. Thurber, resigned.

An invitation was received from the Amalgamated Association lodges to the entertainment to be held in Trades Assembly hall next Saturday evening. On motion of Delegate Tighe, the invitation was accepted.

A communication from the government printing office, stating that upon designation by Congressman Dovenor, the assembly would receive a compilation entitled "Messages and Papers of the Presidents, 1789-1897," was received. On motion, thanks were extended to Captain Dovenor and the public printer; Frank G. Taylor was introduced to the meeting and said he was pushing a petition to be presented at the next session of the West Virginia legislature, prohibiting the employment of females in several manufacturing establishments.

He was followed by Delegates Bauer, Tighe and Sims, and the sentiment of the assembly seemed to be against so broad a resolution. Delegate Duffy moved to endorse the petition and assist in securing signatures. Other delegates spoke against such action and the chair ruled the Duffy motion out of order. The assembly took the position that women should receive the same wages as men, and would exclude girls of tender years. Delegate Tighe's motion to refer the matter to the legislative committee, in conjunction with Mr. Taylor, was passed without opposition.
