An order was entered yesterday in the case of George E. Foster et al, vs. David E. Handley, et al, that the receivers pay to creditors thirty-three per cent of all undisputed claims. The percentage to be paid amounts to \$6,222.88.

Hiram Burkett, committed to jail by Squire Allen, was released upon a writ of habeas corpus.

In the case of Keltz vs. Butler, there was judgment for the plaintiff in the sum of \$200.

The trial of the case of Tillie B. Zilles vs. C. P. Fick, executor of the Barbara Zilles estate, began in Judge Paul's court yesterday.

In the trial of the case of McGannon vs. the city of Wheeling, the city's interests were looked after by City Solicitor Nesbitt, who had the co-operation and assistance of ex-City Solicitor Sam O. Boyce on this occasion. The victory scored by Messrs. Boyce and Nesbitt was complete, the costs being assessed upon the plaintiff.

It receives inmates as well as substantial assistance from all parts of the state. As this is the season of plenty in our country friends we would ask them in their visits to the city to remember that the managers of the home, as well as others, must lay by a supply for the winter months. PUMPING CELLARS.

Ordinance Committee Decides to Charge \$3 per Hour.

OTHER CITIES CHARGE NOTHING

FOR THIS WORK, BUT THE COMMITTEE SAW MANY DIFFICULTIES AND MUCH EXPENSE IN FOLLOWING SUCH A POLICY. OTHER ORDINANCES TO BE PREPARED BY THE SOLICITOR. A REGULAR MEETING OF COUNCIL THIS EVENING.

At a meeting of the council committee on ordinances, held last evening, considerable business preliminary to tonight's meeting of the city legislature was transacted. Chairman Baird occupied the chair.

The resolution from council, calling upon the committee to frame an ordinance that would compel E. B. Potts to construct a wider bridge in front of his new business block, on Market street, and to place a temporary roof over the bridge, was considered. On motion of Mr. List, the matter was referred to the city solicitor to investigate the rules of the board of public works, in order to ascertain if there is not already a rule that covers the case.

The petition of the board of public works for an ordinance compelling the Baltimore & Ohio company to maintain a safety gate at the Forty-third street crossing was, on motion of Mr. List, laid on the table. Members of the committee did not see the necessity for a gate at this point.

Solicitor Nesbitt was requested to prepare an ordinance making it unlawful to hitch horses to shade trees lining the sidewalks on city streets. Members of the committee testified to horses biting into the bark of trees, thus killing them. Clerk O'Brien then read letters from the municipal authorities of Louisville and Cincinnati regarding the charge made in those cities for the pumping of water-filled cellars by the fire engines. In Louisville the engines are never hired out for this work; in cases the work has been done, free of charge. In Pittsburgh the work is done without charge, as a health precautionary measure. The committee discussed the matter at length, and it was the sentiment of the members that there should be a charge. If there was no charge there would be endless applications to the fire department of cellars to be pumped more than anything else they can be applied to. Finally, the committee instructed the solicitor to prepare an ordinance fixing the price at \$3 per hour, and no charge less than \$10 to be made.

REAL ESTATE COMMITTEE.

At the meeting of the council committee on real estate last night, bills aggregating \$423.60 were audited and recommended to council for payment.

COUNCIL TO-NIGHT.

To-night there will be a regular session of the city council, at which considerable routine business will be up for consideration. There is nothing of especial importance on the table.

NEIGHBORS QUARREL

And All Parties are Put Under Bonds to Keep the Peace.

High street figured in Squire Rogers' court yesterday. It was another of those cases where neighbors quarrel, and as customary in such cases, a justice of the peace is called on to diagnose and prescribe accordingly. Mrs. Hazel Kane and Mrs. Lena Slusher were the women who quarreled.

Mrs. Kane preferred two charges against Mrs. Slusher, one of using profane language, the other of threatening to do bodily harm. The first case was dismissed, and on the other Mrs. Slusher was forced to give \$50 bond. Then Mrs. Slusher preferred two similar charges, and Mrs. Kane suffered to the extent of having to give \$50 bond to keep the peace.

It was brought out that Louis Baker, a son of Mrs. Kane by a former husband, was mixed up in the squabble, and he was likewise put under bond. Thus ended the chapter of life on High street.
