HUFF IS NOT DEAD.

A Man who is Suspected of Wife Murder here Identified at

BRIDEWELL PRISON, CHICAGO

THE IDENTIFICATION WAS BROUGHT ABOUT THROUGH A PHOTOGRAPH OF HUFF, WHICH WAS SENT TO CHICAGO BY REV. HERMAN HAASE, OF THIS CITY. A STORY WAS CURRENT RECENTLY THAT HUFF HAD BEEN EXECUTED IN GERMANY.

The sudden death of Mrs. Jacob Adolph Huff, who was formerly Mrs. Jacob Hob, at her home in upper Benwood, in April of 1895, and the supposed suicide of Huff in the Ohio river, his clothes having been found on the Island shore, are remembered by Wheeling people; also the suspicions that arose later that Huff really did not commit suicide and the probability that he had had a hand in the death of his wife, all will be recalled. Only a short time since a story was in circulation in the southern part of the city that Huff had been executed in Germany on an old charge. This latter story, however, must have been a myth, as will be seen from the following Associated Press telegram received by the Intelligencer last night:

A MAN OF ALIASES.

CHICAGO, Oct. 31.—A Bridewell prisoner of many aliases and whom two women claim as their husband, has been identified as the original of a picture forwarded from Wheeling, W. Va., as the likeness of Jacob Adolph Huff, who is suspected of complicity in causing the death of Mrs. Jacob Hob, to whom he was married on April 15, 1895, and whose death occurred two months later. The prisoner is known at the Bridewell as Martin Doty, with several aliases. The letter inclosing the picture was received by the Chicago police Saturday, and was signed by Rev. Herman Haase, of Wheeling.

Mr. Haase said Jacob Adolph Huff married Mrs. Hob, a widow, April 15, 1895. Two months later the woman died suddenly, and the day after her burial Huff disappeared. His clothing and watch were found on the bank of the Ohio river and it was thought grief had led him to commit suicide. The discovery that he had drawn \$900 from the bank and pawned his wife's jewelry caused the Wheeling authorities to change their minds and an examination of the woman's body was made. It was discovered, the clergyman's letter indicated, that she had not died a natural death. A week ago Rev. Haase, after reading the arrest of a polygamist in Chicago, one of whose aliases was Hobsent the picture. To-day detectives recognized Doty as the original of the picture.

Doty denied ever having been in Wheeling. He has been in the Bridewell several weeks. Nearly a month ago it was discovered that he was wanted in Milwaukee for bigamy. An investigation developed that at least ten women claimed his as their husband. He was not suspected of murder until Rev. Haase's letter arrived.

RED HOT CELEBRATION

Of Hallowe'en Kept the Police Force Very Busy Last Evening.

The observance of Hallowe'en last night was general, to say the least, and prosperity was evident judging by the way the kids played fast and loose with corn and rice. No wedding couple ever was showered with more rice than were some law-abiding citizen's doorsteps, and there was abundance of corn in Egypt if the amount spread on the pavements was any indication.

The small boy is a come-to-the-front individual at all times, except it be when school bells ring, but he was on hand in all his glory last night. Christmas wasn't in it. The ubiquitous kid was here, there and everywhere, and the police were kept busy. Door bells were rung. Doors were hammered at. Gates were lifted from their hinges—in short, the old-time Hallowe'en pranks were carried on just the same as they were years ago.

Viewed from social X-rays the occasion was more than of ordinary note. The taffy-pullin's were especially conspicuous, and in all the wards the odor of the succulent concoction was borne on the dying October night breezes. It was social festivity inside the house, and small boy activity outside.

The deadly weapon, the bean-shooter, rent havoc. And then came the tick-tack and others. Hallowe'en of 1898 received all the honors due the occasion, and if nothing else it will go on record as a howling success.

RIVER PIRATE CAPTURED

Yesterday Afternoon at His Home Near Martin's Ferry.

Marshal Lindemuth, of Martin's Ferry, accompanied by Officers Westwood and Brown, started yesterday afternoon in search of John Davis, and as a result their man is now reposing in the city bastille. Davis is a member of the Gear-McKnight gang of river pirates, who were arrested near New Martinsville several weeks ago, and until Friday night have been held at that place for trial, but some time during that night made their escape from the jail by sawing the iron bars.

He was found at the home of his grandmother, who resides about one and a half miles up Glenn's Run, on the Ohio side, above Martin's Ferry, where he had gone for refuge, arriving there Sunday night. He made no resistance after his apprehension and will be turned over to West Virginia authorities to-day. All the members of the trio held from Martin's Ferry, but as yet the whereabouts of the other two men is not known. The officials should be congratulated on making this important arrest.
