An Insurance Case. Detective R. T. McNichol on Saturday, under instructions of the state auditor, L. M. Lafollette, arrested H. T. Howell, an insurance agent of Bridgeport, for violating the insurance law of West Virginia, by soliciting and writing policies of insurance in companies not authorized to do business in this state. Mr. Howell waived examination and was held under a bond of \$500 to appear before the next grand jury. It is said other arrests for the same offense will follow.

BLACK BASS GALORE

Will be Placed in Wheeling Creek Next Friday by the

UNITED STATES FISH COMMISSION

FISH COMMISSION'S CAR NO. 3 BRINGS 75,000 BLACK BASS FOR DISTRIBUTION ALONG THE WHEELING CREEK VALLEY. THE DISTRIBUTION WILL BE UNDER THE DIRECTION OF COL. GEORGE WISE AND LOCAL FISHERMEN.

Seventy-five thousand specimens of the finny tribes of black bass and crappie will find their way into the waters of Wheeling creek this week, and if the little fellows are guarded against the unlawful acts of the dynamiter and the fellows who seine, old Wheeling creek will in the course of a year or two, regain its once enviable reputation as one of the best small fishing streams in this region.

Last spring, it will be remembered, through the efforts of Colonel George Wise and other gentlemen who take an interest in things piscatorial, the national fish commissioner, Hon. George M. Bowers, who, by the way, is a West Virginian, was induced to promise to stock Wheeling creek with newly spawned fish when the season was propitious. Commissioner Bowers has lost no time in complying with the terms of the protocol, by which he was guaranteed future immunity from the wiles of such enterprising and persistent gentlemen as Colonel Wise.

The latter gentleman yesterday received a letter from the fish commissioner, as follows:

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 29, 1898. "Mr. T. C. Pearce, U. S. Fish Commission, Car No. 3, Quincy, Ill.

"Dear Sir:—On the arrival of car No. 3 at Quincy, you will proceed at once to Wheeling, West Virginia, taking with you sixty adult black bass and as many small black bass and crappie as Dr. Bartlett can furnish. The route of the car should be over the Washburn railroad and Big Four to Columbus, and thence over the B. & O. to Wheeling. On your arrival at Wheeling the fish are to be planted under the direction of Mr. George Wise, in Wheeling creek.

"After completing this work you will return to Quincy over the same route. These fish should arrive at Wheeling by the middle or last of next week without fail. Respectfully, J. FRANK ELLIS, Superintendent Car and Messenger Service. (Signed) "GEO. M. BOWERS, Commissioner."

Captain Pearce, of Car No. 3, was at once telegraphed to at Quincy, the request being made that he name the time of the arrival of himself and car (also the fishes) in Wheeling. Last night an answer was received, in which Captain Pearce stated that the car would reach Wheeling via the Baltimore & Ohio road at either 12:15 or 4:20 on next Friday morning.

Colonel Wise has arranged with several of Wheeling's enthusiastic fishermen to assist him in the distribution of the fishes. The fish commissioner's car will be sent out to Elm Grove and sidetracks. Thence the fishes will be taken in specially constructed receptacles up both branches of Wheeling creek and "planted." This work will occupy several hours and will be most interesting to all interested in such matters.

At the same time, the fish commission will turn over to the management of Wheeling Park, sixty full grown bass, which will be placed in the lake at the park, where it is expected they will multiply rapidly.

TO CONNECT TRACKS.

Application to Bridgeport Council by the Wheeling Railway Company.

At the meeting of the Bridgeport city council last night, the Wheeling Railway Company asked for permission to connect its track at Bridgeport with the main tracks of the Bellaire, Bridgeport & Martin's Ferry railway. The petition was referred to council's ordinance committee, which will meet this evening in conference with the railway officials. The Bridgeport council has called a special meeting for to-morrow evening to receive the committee's report.

Among other business transacted, the council decided to make the minimum penalty of selling liquor on Sundays at the discretion of the mayor. The minimum penalty heretofore has been \$25. The maximum, \$50, will remain the same.

Chief Bennett's Report.

Chief Bennett's report for October was as follows: Number of arrests, 103; white males, 73; colored males, 3; female white, 27; males to city prison, 20; females to county jail, 5; fines paid, 68; suspended, 8; dismissed, 7; amount assessed, \$738 40; paid, \$350 80. The police department has collected in fines for ten months of 1898 the sum of \$6,972. The estimated receipts, which figured in this year's appropriation ordinance, were \$7,000, so the department has to collect only \$28 in November and December to meet the estimate.
