NO FREE TOLLS. On the Bridges for Island Pupils of City-side Schools.

ADVERSE OPINION TO PROJECT SUBMITTED BY JUDGE CRANMER TO BOARD OF EDUCATION LAST NIGHT—THE BOARD HADN'T THE LEGAL RIGHT TO DISCRIMINATE IN FAVOR OF ONE SECTION OF THE CITY—THE FULTON SCHOOL BOARD CONTRAVERSELY CONSIDERED.

The board of education held a regular meeting last night with a fair attendance of members, President J. A. Jefferson in the chair. The usual committee reports were received, and the resolution introduced several months ago, calling for the payment of the bridge tolls of Island children attending city-side schools, received a death blow in the opinion submitted by Judge Cranmer.

The finance committee submitted Judge Cranmer's opinion relative to the legality of paying bridge tolls for Island children attending the High and Lincoln schools. Judge Cranmer held to the opinion that the board of education had no authority in paying the bridge tolls, and he cited many court rulings of West Virginia and other states in support of his opinion.

The reading of this opinion led to a discussion as to the legality of the board's paying for the tuition of children attending a school—Fulton—outside of the independent school district of Wheeling. The board has been paying for children living near the Terminal tunnel, quite a distance from Washington school. None of the board sought to uphold its legality, other than it was done in all fairness and that the precedent had been established.

On motion of Mr. Hubbard the sum of \$300 was appropriated for the repair of furnaces at Lincoln school. Miss Bertha M. Fette was confirmed as teacher in Ritchie school, and promotions of teachers in Clay district were confirmed.

Superintendent Anderson's monthly report showed the following statistics for the past month:

The superintendent's report showed that in the German department the month's enrollment was 571; pupils of German parentage, 284; and of German parentage, 287.

Miss A. B. Wilson, librarian, submitted the report of the public library, which showed an average daily circulation of 225 books and periodicals, a total circulation of 5,844; amount received from fines, \$10.

In September the board appointed a committee to suggest changes to the school law governing Wheeling, and this committee reported in favor of changing the time for taking the school enumeration from July to May.
