## BRITISH WILL TRY FOR SOUTH POLE

(Continued from Page One.)

and Doctor, who will study botany and bacteriology, giving particular attention to the investigation of blood parasites.

Mr. C. R. Meares, who lately completed a most interesting journey on the Chino-Siberian border, has started for Eastern Siberia, to obtain poles and dogs for the expedition. Mr. Meares has close knowledge of the region he is about to visit and of the language spoken there. He will probably have to travel a long distance to obtain the best dogs, hence an early departure, but hopes to find it easier to secure the poles required.

He will collect his animals at Vlodivostok, whence they will be sent to Kioe and transhipped for Australia and New Zealand. Mr. Meares will join the Terra Nova in New Zealand.

Other members of the expedition will be selected in time for them to prepare themselves to assist efficiently with magnetic and meteorological observations.

The leading parties will probably consist of thirty men in all, twenty-five of whom will be at the large station and five at the second station.

An improved motor-vehicle of a type tried successfully last year in Norway is being constructed for the expedition, and will undergo further trials, for which purpose Captain Scott will proceed early next year with the motor sledges to Norway. These further trials will be made in February or March, when the snow will be in its condition.

With regard to equipment steps are also being taken to order skins of young reindeer for our sleeping bags, and the best kind of muskox or reindeer, which have to be obtained from Lapland, and also the best class of wood for sledges. Details will regard to these matters will be adjusted when Captain Scott visits Norway.
