### GRIFFITH TRIAL GOES OVER TO SEPTEMBER

Point Pleasant, June 8.—Judge O'Brien of the Mason county circuit court today postponed until the September term of court the trial of W. H. (Holly) Griffith for the murder of Ira Roush. The action was taken at the instance of the defense, which claimed that it would be unable at this time to produce essential witnesses, who, it is reported, will tend to prove an alibi for the accused man. Griffith, a West Virginia life termer, killed a fellow convict in the penitentiary at Moundsville on the night of January 9, last made his escape, and was later captured by a South Carolina constable. The state alleged that Griffith, while fleeing down the Ohio river, murdered Roush.

William Montgomery, aged 84, a Confederate veteran, who was injured in an automobile accident while returning from the Confederate reunion, at Romney, died at Grace's Station, Hampshire county, where he was taken after the accident. Shock helped greatly toward hastening the end. A man named O'Brien was driving the car and lost control while descending a hill, the machine upsetting, throwing both out. O'Brien was hurt but little.

### CONFERENCE TENTATIVELY ON ROAD CONSTRUCTION

Charleston, June 8.—Tentative plans for road construction throughout the state were considered at a conference between the two members of the state road commission and the district engineers, which ended yesterday afternoon. No definite action was taken on any plan because only two members of the commission, Major C. P. Fortney and Dr. E. B. Stephenson, have been appointed. The appointment of the third member of the road commission has not yet been announced by Governor Morgan.

It is understood that another conference will be held on June 17 and 18. This conference is also to be of tentative character unless the governor appoints the third member of the commission by that time.


