BABY'S WELFARE IS MOST IMPORTANT

Declares Miss Leete of the Cleveland Dispensary in Address Before the Woman's Club Yesterday.

Asserting that the welfare of the baby is the foremost civic problem, around which all reforms are concentrated, Miss Harriett L. Leete of the Baby's Dispensary of Cleveland, outlined a program for the "Baby Welfare Week," to be conducted under the auspices of the Woman's club in Wheeling some time in May.

"The welfare of the baby is one of the biggest problems of every community," Miss Leete said. "Around it all other reforms are centered. When a city starts a campaign for public sanitation, a better water system or any like reforms, it improves conditions incident to the child's life indirectly."

Miss Leete told of the accomplishments of the Baby's Dispensary in Cleveland. It was organized ten years ago, and each ensuing year has added new accomplishments. It has never taken a backward step, and today is one of the greatest institutions in the country for the betterment of the conditions of the child.

"In Ohio there is a law that provides for an expenditure averaging one-half a cent of the dollar for preventive methods, thirty-three and one-half cents go to the cure. This should be reversed," Miss Leete said, "and conditions would be better in every way."

"The welfare of our babies is the foundation of all civic reforms," the speaker said, "and every organization with objects for civic improvements should get together and make it a success."

Nothing was done toward making plans for the observance of Baby Week in Wheeling, the members of the Woman's club desiring to hear of the suggestions of Miss Leete before appointing any committees. It is probable that a meeting of the board will be held Monday or some time during the coming week, when plans will be inaugurated.

MINISTERS TO HEAR OF RESCUE MISSION

Parkersburg Man Will Tell Wheeling Association of Plans At a Meeting Monday in Y.M.C.A.

Wheeling ministers at the monthly meeting of the Wheeling Ministerial Union Monday will be told of plans whereby a mission could be formed in this city, by G. W. Cory, of Parkersburg. Mr. Cory has been in Wheeling during the past week and has conferred with many of the clergymen here.

They seem to be heartily in favor of the plan.

Mr. Cory recently assisted in the organization of a mission in Parkersburg. It has been open ninety days and during that time 180 have been converted, 50 per cent of whom are men; 500 meals have been served and more than 200 given lodging. Others in West Virginia that have attained like success are located in Charleston and Huntington.

"Wheeling or any city its size needs a mission," Mr. Cory said. "There are many fallen men and women who will enter the doors of the mission for aid. Living to the motto, 'Soup, Soap and Salvation,' the mission's attendants give them assistance and later entreat with the person to reform and will ultimately be influential in bringing him into the church."

Mr. Cory, for a number of years was one of the many for whom all hope of saving had been given up, found himself in a Y. M. C. A. meeting. An inventory of himself revealed that he had been tested and found wanting, he says. He was converted and has since given his entire time to saving his fellowmen. His knowledge of the conditions has made him a success in mission work.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

WILL APPEAL CASE

Attorney Brann of New York to Carry Suit of Whitaker vs. W. I. Co. to Higher Court.

The suit of Martha E. Whitaker and others against the Whitaker Iron company, which was dismissed in the United States district court a few days ago by Judge A. G. Dayton, will be appealed from his decision, according to Harry A. Brann, Jr., counsel for the plaintiff. The suit was dismissed because the plaintiff's attorney failed to file a bill of particulars as requested by the defendant. Attorney Brann said that in dismissing the suit it was an extraordinary decision and there appears to be no precedent in this country. It is said that the decision is founded upon an old English chancery rule. The outcome of the appeal will be watched with deep professional interest all over the country. Attorney Brann is a prominent member of the New York bar.
