THE GOVERNOR
Accepts the Invitation to Open the Elks' Street Fair.
TO DELIVER OPENING ADDRESS
Things Rounding Into Shape Nicely for the Summer Carnival—Wheeling Lodge's Successful "Stag" Last Night the Last Until the Fall—Presided Over by Congressman Dovener. Lodge Given a Banner.
Governor Atkinson yesterday accepted the invitation to make the opening address at the Elks' street fair in this city, the latter week of June. Wheeling lodge, No. 28, B. P. O. E., a few days ago invited the governor to perform this office and in his reply to C. Resley Tracy, of the executive committee, the governor added that in all likelihood several state officers would accompany him from Charleston. The Allegheny, Pa., lodge of Elks is to have the fair attraction two weeks later than Wheeling, and Governor Stone, of Pennsylvania, will deliver the opening address.
Last night Wheeling lodge gave the last social session of the season, and from now until the fair the lodge will put forth its best efforts to make the summer carnival the success it certainly will be. Yesterday's Intelligencer noted some of the features of each day of "carnival week," and the committee are perfecting arrangements for many others. The lodge has decided on a specially designed cap to be worn by local Elks during the fair.
Congressman B. B. Dovener was chairman at last night's social session, which was held in Arlon hall. The attendance was good and embraced many visiting brothers. A business meeting preceded the "stag," four new members being elected and five applications received that will be acted on at the next meeting. There were no initiations. The lodge now numbers 218 members.
Fortunate is the individual invited to an Elks' social session. There is "the feast of reason and the flow of soul," and likewise the feast of substantial and the flow of liquids, with cigars, music, song and anecdotes on the side. The antlered gentlemen who have deviated from the path of righteousness according to the judgment of the chairman are ever and anon escorted to the throne and assessed fines, a quarter being the minimum limit. The deputies sworn in to enforce the injunction last night were Captain John Cummins and Major Nell Quinn.
The Opera House orchestra furnished occasional snatches of melody, and the Pasmala Quartette, composed of colored gentlemen, sang, with appropriate addresses and other remarks were made by Fred H. Lange, J. B. Handlan and F. Enoch, of this city, Mr. Hall, of Allegheny, and Mr. Chappie, of Grand Rapids. Ralph Heyman recited and Secretary Thomas O'Brien, Jr., was forced to respond to the toast of "If I Were City Clerk," which he did in a humorous manner. Charley D. Kyle had to explain why he changed his residence from Short Creek to Wheeling.
The committee in charge was composed of Harry L. Wheat, Charles A. Aul, Charles J. Killmyer, A. A. Maris and James G. Campbell.
The members of the lodge were agreeably surprised, and, in fact, delighted to receive for the lodge a handsome silk banner, presented by one of the charter members, whose modesty forbids using his name. The banner is certainly a beauty and was deeply appreciated.

BRIEF FREEDOM
Enjoyed by Frank Giffen, Arrested After Jail Release.
Frank Giffen was released from the county jail yesterday and last night he was placed in the lockup. The grand jury failed to find against him on the charge of bunking the unwary. Last night he ran up a bill of drinks in Ben Wilkie's saloon, on Sixteenth street, totaling \$2.50, and left the saloon without paying for his refreshments. Wilkie followed him into Oscar Gardner's saloon, on Market street, and a lively scene ensued. The police were notified and Lieutenant Ed. Michaels arrested Giffen, who is big enough to eat the wily lieutenant up. He showed fight, but Michaels gave him a right hook on the jaw, and soon had him handcuffed, after which proceeding Giffen accompanied him as meek as a lamb.
Charges of disorderly conduct and abusive language were placed against Giffen, and he will appear before the mayor this morning. Giffen is registered on the police docket as a bunco man, and he is said to be an expert flim-flammer.

WILL CAUCUS TO-NIGHT
Republican Councilmen to Name the New City Clerk.
The Republican members of the city council will likely caucus to-night to name their candidate for the office of city clerk, a position that will be vacant if the present official, Charles H. Watkins, carries out his intention of resigning. Last night it was said that all but three of the twenty-six Republican councilmen had signed the call for the caucus, which will be held in the second branch council chamber this evening at 8 o'clock. The candidates are Clerk of the First Branch Thomas O'Brien, Jr., City Receiver A. H. Forgy, Assistant City Clerk William Nolte, N. C. Hamilton and Councilman John W. Kinkelberger.
Some take the view that a caucus shouldn't be held until there is a vacancy, and Clerk Watkins' resignation in the near future is not a certainty, as he has declared that he will not tender his resignation unless he believes the mantle of office will fall on the shoulders of a man satisfactory to the people at large.
