## MRS. FLADING SUCCUMBS TO HER INJURIES

Received in the Natural Gas Explosion—Death Came at 1 O'Clock This Morning.

### IN RELIEF OF SUFFERINGS

That Were More Than the Human Frame Could Endure—Other Victim Still Lives.

At 1 o'clock this morning, in the house which was well nigh wrecked by Wednesday morning's natural gas explosion, at No. 2005 Eoff street, South Side, details of which were given in the Intelligencer yesterday morning, occurred the death of Mrs. Helen Flading, after the most poignant sufferings, which were more than the human frame could endure. Her body was burned from head to foot, and it was felt by the attending physician, Dr. H. F. Linsz, from the start that the injured woman could not live.

The news of Mrs. Flading's death will be received with genuine sorrow. She was a hard-working woman, who supported herself by conducting a boarding house. Not only was her house wrecked and she injured terribly, but now the Grim Reaper makes his appearance, and the tale of horror is complete.

The little girl, "Tony" Meyer, who was taken to the City hospital, was resting somewhat easier last night, but as fully one-third of her body is a mass of burns, the fear is expressed that she may die.

The house was damaged \$500, and is now being repaired.
