HOW TO CLEAN FURS.

Helpful Hints on the Renovation of Last Year's Furs. Ermine and sealskin are best cleaned with soft flannel. Rub the fur delicately against the grain, and when it has been thoroughly lifted and reversed, so to speak, dip the flannel into common flour and rub lightly any spots that look dark or dirty.

How to Tell the Course of Air When the Wind is Still.

Set a basin of water outside and throw a redhot coal into it, noticing which way the smoke moves. This resembles the one method used by sailors, who throw a live coal into the sea. If too rough they wet a finger and hold it in the air, noting which part cools first.

How to Make a Party Album.

This is a gift for only an intimate friend, and for it a small blank book, as nice as you please, but with limp binding, is procurable. Poems, quotations and sentiments that you know are favorites of the recipient are written on different pages, each being for a special date in the year.

How to Wash Red Flannel.

Mix a handful of flower in a quart of cold water and boil ten minutes. Add this to warm suds and wash the flannel gently with a rinsing motion. Rinse in three or four warm waters.

How to Make a Worsted Ball for a Child.

Prepare two round cardboard 2 1/2 inches in diameter, with small holes in their centers. Wind the cards, laid together, with gay worsteds, passing them around the edge of the cards and through the center hole. Continue until the hole is completely filled and the worsted is thick on the cards, winding loosely at the start, but tighter as you proceed.

How to Prevent Cramp.

Cramp can be prevented by holding rolled brimstone in the hand. The legs should be rubbed with sweet oil twice a week.

How to Reduce Hip Measure.

Get up on a box or anything that will raise you a few inches from the floor. Stand firmly on one foot, place the hands on the hips, stiffen the knee of the other leg and swing the leg from the hip backward and forward without bending at the waist. Reverse the movement every few minutes and if possible continue the exercise an hour each day for two months, and there will be a decided difference in your hip measure.

How to Make Windows Like Ground Glass.

Brush the glass with a hot solution of sal ammoniac. It will evaporate instantly, leaving a beautiful radiated deposit.

How to Make a Good Salve.

A good salve for burns, scalds, cuts, etc., can be made as follows: Take equal parts of yellow dock and dandelion roots, add a good proportion ofcelandine, an plantain, extract the juices by steeping and pressing, strain carefully and simmer the liquid with sweet cream, fresh butter and mutton tallow. Simmer together until no appearance of the liquid remains; before it is quite cold put it in boxes.

How to Bleach Yellow Linen.

Linen made yellow by careless washing can be restored by working it well in water to which has been added a clear solution of chloride of lime. Rinse before and after.

How to Clean Japanned Goods.

Hot water will cause scaling; therefore sponge the articles with white soap and lukewarm water, then wash clean. Wipe dry, sprinkle flour over them and rub with a soft, dry cloth, finishing with a silk handkerchief. Rub white spots caused by heat with a flannel dipped in sweet oil and then spirits of wine. Such spots, however, are hard to remove.

How to Shell Beans Easily.

Pour scalding water over the pods, after which the beans will slip out readily. Appleskins may be removed in this way.

How to Restore Crape.

Water leaves white spots on crape. To restore it lay the spotted places over old black silk, fastening the crape smoothly down. Apply ink with a camel's

hair brush, wiping any surplus of it off with a bit of the silk. The ink dries at once, restoring the black to the crape.

HOW TO CARE FOR CLOTHES.

Practical Hints to Men on the Preservation of Garments. When the clothes are removed the coat should be slipped over a bow hanger—the vest may be put on it first.

HOW TO SKATE FAST.

An Expert Gives Some Interesting and Seasonable Information. Joseph F. Donohue, who is recognized as the champion amateur skater of the world, in giving instructions to his friends, tells them to first learn to stand perfectly even on their skates, so that the edges of the blades will not cut the ice. To gain headway at first balance on the left foot, give a slight sidelong push with the right and swing the body forward.

How to Prevent the Rusting of Screws.

Before putting the screws in place dip them in a thin paste made of graphite and oil.

How to Make an "Emergency Case."

Linens "emergency cases" for traveling are made of gray linen, bonnet with blue, red or black braid, like a small brush and comb case. At one end is a wide pocket divided into three compartments, which hold respectively an envelope of court plaster, a package of antiseptic cotton and a flat card wound with fine linen twine.

How to Exterminate Moths.

It is claimed that whole cloves are better than cedar chips, camphor or tobacco as a protection against the ravenous moth.

How to Lessen Wrinkles.

Those having a flabby skin are troubled most with wrinkles. Years ago the ladies of England used a substance called "wool fat," which they obtained by getting the clippings of sheeps wool and steeping it in alcohol. It can be prepared at home or found at the drug gists.

How to Remove Moles.

Moles are a kind of tumor and may be removed, when not too large, if not located on a vein. This is sometimes done by electricity but when the mole is round and like a bead on the flesh, a horsehair tied tightly around its base will soon remove it. Tie it at first as tight as you can stand it, and every day draw the hair tighter. On the third or fourth day the mole will fall off, the hair having gradually cut it through.

How to Renovate Oilcloth.

Dissolve 2 1/2 pounds paraffine and one gallon of oil of turpentine in a apply white warm with a sponge or flannel. Let it alone for a day, then polish with a flannel. This completely renews old oilcloth, and is also good for painted floors.

How to Keep Musical Instruments Moist.

Keep the wood with pure glycerin occasionally and wipe with a soft cloth.

How to Render Canned Fruit Airtight.

After the usual methods and tests have been resorted to tie a square of cotton wadding over the top of the jar around the rubber, securing it very tightly with twine or white cord. This renders it absolutely airtight.

How to Cure a Felon.

Mix equal parts of strong ammonia and water and hold the finger in it for fifteen minutes. Then tie a cloth wet with the mixture about it and keep it on till dry. A remedy to be used at the beginning of a felon is composed of one ounce Venice turpentine in one-half teaspoonful of water spread on a cloth and tied on the finger.

How to Clarify Molasses.

Molasses is clarified and made to taste better by heating it and pouring in a pint of sweet milk to every gallon of molasses. Let it boil up, and remove the thick scum from the top.

How to Make Eggnog.

Beat the yolks of half a dozen fresh eggs with one-quarter pound of powdered sugar. Stir in one-quarter pint each of brandy and Jamaica rum. Add 1 1/2 quarts of milk or cream and one-quarter of a nutmeg grated. Beat the whites to a stiff froth and stir in 1 1/2 ounces of powdered sugar, and add this to the mixture. Sprinkle powdered cinnamon over the top.

How to Restore Gloss to a Silk Hat.

Clean from dust and apply petrolatum with a silk handkerchief, rubbing with the same until it is dry and glossy.

How to Make Clover Pillows.

Use only the blossoms, and pack them first in slips of strong muslin. Make an outside slip or case of clover blossom cretonne, or embroider on silk or other art cloth delicate pink and white clover blossoms. Use decorative ribbon of both shades found in the pattern.

How to Detect a Leak in a Gas Pipe.

Rub soapy water on the suspected place. A bubble will form over the leak.

How to Keep Milk from Souring.

Add a small quantity of boracic acid to it.
